Justice Henry J. Bean Petitions Probating of Wife's Estate

Petitions for an election to form the proposed Vista Heights water district south of Salem carried more than required number of signatures of legal voters, County Clerk U. G. Boyer announced yesterday afternoon. A supplemental petition filed yesterday increased the total number of signers to 45.

The clerk said the petitions would be presented to the county court at its first meeting of the new term March 1. The court is required by law to call the district election within from 30 to 50 days.

Proponents of the district plan hope to secure water from the Salem city system to supply approximately 150 families.
