Forgery Cases Sentence Pair

Vicari and Selig Plead Guilty Upon Charges; Suspend One Term

Two forgery cases were disposed of before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday afternoon. James Anthony Vicari, originally charged as Sicari, waived indictment and pleaded guilty to the charge. He was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary. He was accused of forging the name of Salem Iron Works by C. E. Bolton to a \$42.57 check made out to H. L. Lowell.

In the other case Alpha Selig also pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary but the operation of the sentence was suspended.

Trial of C. W. Beecroft involving an appealed drunken driving charge was begun before Judge McMahan, without a jury, but continued for further testimony.

The new organization will become a part of a national chain of organizations of young business men who have played prominent parts in the activities of both their local communities and those of their state and nation.

To Choose Best Citizen

The local junior chamber will participate in the national program along this line by designating, each year, a junior citizen of Salem, to be selected for his contribution to the welfare and betterment of Salem and its community. This award is not confined to members of the organization.

To date the local chapter has nearly 40 active members.

Hospital Employee Suicide Mystery

The reason for the suicide of Daniel Crookston, 45-year-old attendant, late Wednesday night was still a mystery to Oregon State hospital authorities last night. They were unable to furnish information that would indicate a possible clue as to why Crookston hooked a hose from the exhaust pipe of his car to the interior, shut the door and took his life.

Although an employe for but six weeks, Crookston had had previous hospital experience at the Eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton and at one of the Washington institutions.

He leaves two children of high school age at Sedro-Wooley.

ROSEBURG, March 2—(P)—Convicted by a circuit court jury on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, A. J. McDonald, former wine store manager here, was sentenced to four years in the state penitentiary today.

The grand jury indicted McDonald on four counts, but one was found innocent of the first. District Attorney J. V. Long said the remaining indictments would be continued.

Pacific Highway's Re-Routing Urged

Shift Asked Near Tigard; Houck Firm of Salem Gets Klamath Job

PORTLAND, March 2—(P)—Re-routing of the Pacific highway west of Tigard was asked of the state highway commission by Thomas Tongue, jr., of Hillsboro today.

Numerous other requests marked the opening of a two-day session.

Contracts totaling \$63,803 were awarded in Columbia, Klamath and Union counties and a fourth contract was referred to the engineer with authority to award it to the lowest bidder.

The Marion county, spring show will be held June 1, the Polk county show May 27 and the Linn-Benton show May 25. County shows will be held each day, except Sunday and Memorial day, from May 24 through June 2.
