Supt. Turner came to Oregon in 1904, serving as superintendin 1904, serving as superintend-ent of the Grants Pass schools for 19 years, then resigning in 1914 to accept a federal appoint-ment as receiver of he United States land office at Roseburg He returned to school work in 1921 coming to Dallas as sup-erintendent of schools and has Churchill as superintendent of public instruction.

Active in OSTA Supt. Turner has .ad an important part in the school af-fairs of the state, having served as president and executive committee member of the Oregon State Teachers' associatior, f which he was one of the organizers and incorporators. As chairman of the legislative com-mittee of the OSTA for a 1umber of years he pla ed an im-portant part in shaping school legislation. He was on the textook commission 12 years.

Under his supervision the Dallas high school has 'ecome recognized as one of the outstanding schools of the state, taking high place in many state con-tests and winning many coveted trophies.
