

Farm Program For Polk Topic

Cooperators in AAA Are to Have Individual Assistance, Said

DALLAS—Polk county farmers cooperating in the 1939 AAA farm program soon will receive individual assistance from county and community committees in planning how the program applies to their own lands, according to W. C. Leth, of Dallas, county agent and secretary of the Polk county Agricultural Conservation association.

This will be accomplished, it was said, by the filling out by each farmer before June 1 of an "estimate sheet," showing how he expects to arrange his farming this year so as to receive greatest benefits under the federal program. Information will include expected acreages, diversions, expected payments and compliance methods.

At a meeting at the courthouse in Dallas recently, county and community committees made preliminary plans for a series of neighborhood meetings. Committee men will be present to explain details of the program and help fill out the "estimate sheets."

Percentage High Conservation practices will form an important phase of the 1939 AAA program, it appeared following the meeting, attended by representatives of the 1600 farms in this county signed up as cooperators. It was pointed out that Polk county farmers are showing outstanding cooperation with the farm program, having brought approximately 95 per cent

of their crop lands into compliance, said to be the largest percentage in western Oregon. County Agent Leth stressed that conservation practices recommended the last two years by Polk county farmers' own land use committee. It is closely with practices suggested by AAA.

Robert Mitchell of Perrydale, vice-chairman of the committee, presided in absence of R. D. Pence, chairman. Willis Boeghl of Corvallis, representative of the state AAA office, outlined features of the 1939 program as they apply to Polk county.
