Demand for Chicks Heavy and Hatchings Sold to Mid-May

LEBANON—L. E. Arnold, Lebanon poultryman, has recently placed a 10,000 capacity incubator at his plant and has delivered 200 turkey poults to Miller and Leech, Blodgett, Benton county growers. He plans to set from 80,000 to 100,000 turkey eggs this season. The demand for chicks has been heavy and he has sold future hatchings to the middle of May.

Mr. and Mrs. Preston Ireland have a hatch of nine heavy turkeys, a cross between a turkey and chicken showing the bare, ugly neck of the turkey, a drooping tail and the bill of a chicken. They are of rapid growth and said to be good for table purposes.

The rope by which it was tied had become completely twisted around its neck. Evidently the colt had pulled it tight in an effort to shake it off.

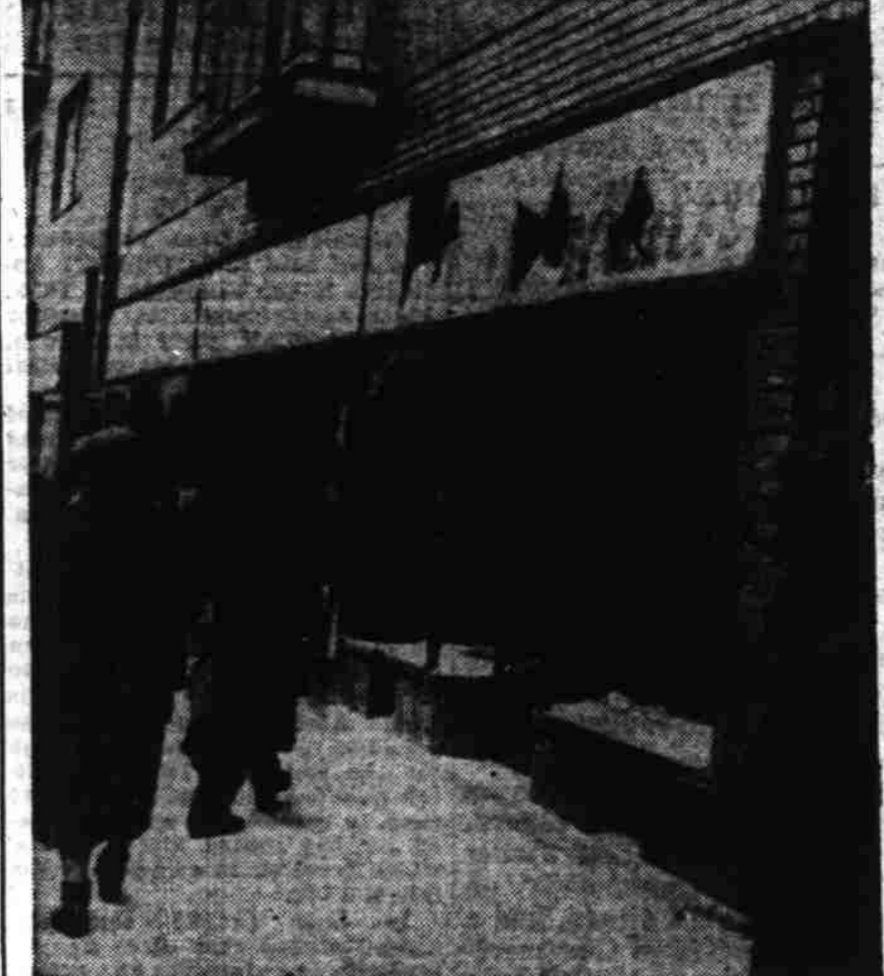
Hand raising had proved successful and the colt was much prized by the family.
