Death Warrant of a Nation

und Landesvertrauensvoll in die Hände des Führers von Deutschland übergeben. Der Führer hat diese Erklärung angenommen und seinen Entschlossen Ausdruck gegeben, die an das tschechische Volk unter dem Schutz des Deutschen Reiches abzugeben und ihm seine eigene Zukunft selbst nach seiner Entschlossenheit zu überlassen.

This document, dated March 15, 1939, ended the independent republic of Czechoslovakia and gave Nazi Germany control of three of the four provinces of the short-lived war-torn country. The document, in German, declares: "The Fuehrer (Hitler) has accepted this declaration (to assure calm order and peace in this part of Central Europe) and has expressed his decision to take the Czech people under the protection of the German Reich and assure them the development of indigenous life in accordance with their own character."

The document is signed, at left, by Joachim von Ribbentrop, German foreign minister, and at right, by Emil Hacha, last president of Czechoslovakia, and Dr. Frantisek Chvalkovsky, last Czech foreign minister.
