

Death Warrant of a Nation

The document, in German, declares: "The Fuehrer (Hitler) has accepted this declaration (to assure calm order and peace in this part of Central Europe) and has expressed his decision to take the Ozech people under the protection of the German Reich and assure them the development of indegenous life in accordance with their own character." The document is signed, at left, by Joachim von Ribbentrop, German foreign minister, and at right, by Emil Hacha, last president of Czechoslovakia, and Dr. Frantisek Chvalkovaky, last Czech foreign minister.
