

House Passes Bill for WPA

50 Million Below FDR's Request; 200,000 to Be Cut off Rolls

sons be taken off relief rolls by April 5. This will bring the rolls down to a total of 2,500,000. "If \$150,000,000 had been appropriated, WPA would have reduced its rolls approximately 100,000 in April," a WPA statement said. It added that if the house had turned down the president's request entirely, 400,000 would have been cut off the rolls next week.

From the house, the appropriation goes to the senate and to an uncertain fate. Efforts to restore the \$50,000,000 lopped off the sum requested by the president are expected.

The \$100,000,000 is intended to supplant money already appropriated to carry WPA through June 30.

President Roosevelt asked in January for \$75,000,000 to cover the last five months of the year. Congress appropriated \$75,000,000 instead, and Mr. Roosevelt immediately asked that the difference of \$10,000,000 be provided. Later, he repeated his request. Today's action was the outcome.

The effort of administration supporters to increase the appropriation to \$150,000,000 today was defeated on a tie vote, 205 to 156, and the increase to \$125,000,000 was rejected, 207 to 150, also on a tie vote. A reduction to \$54,293,575, proposed by Rep. Cox (D-Ga.), was beaten by a 161 to 111 division vote. Rep. Taber (R-N.Y.) moved that the bill be recommitted with instructions that the amount be cut to \$55,000,000. He lost 277 to 130 on a roll call vote.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—(AP)—WPA Administrator F. C. Harrington ordered today that WPA enrollment be decreased from 3,000,000 to 2,500,000 by April 5.

The following table shows, by states, the number of persons who may be employed in April under Harrington's order, and the employment authorized in March:

Idaho, 10,570 and 11,500; Montana, 16,350 and 18,000; Oregon, 17,080 and 18,500; Washington, 42,150 and 46,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—Expansion of national defense is the most popular of the Roosevelt policies, Allen F. Britt told the Jackson club of Oregon.

"In the last six years the armed forces of the nation have made a very sane recovery from the decade following the Washington treaty," he said. "The administration is following the middle of the road in contrast with disarmament and the present hysterical rearmament in Europe."

"Sitting and Visiting" not Only Work Of Governor; Most Visitors Seeking Political Positions He Cannot Offer

A few days ago a little girl walked into the executive offices and, upon seeing Gov. Charles A. Sprague sitting at his desk and talking to a visitor, said to her mother:

"He's sure got an easy job. All he has to do is sit and visit."

The former editor, who has held his first political job for less than three months, doesn't like the "sitting and visiting" part of the job, because most of the visitors are after jobs which he cannot give them. So he won't agree with the little girl that his job is easy.

He comes to work every morning about 8 o'clock and never leaves until after 5 p. m., and he often works on state matters in the library at his home.

Long Session Weathered

The governor's first legislative session without letting it get on his nerves. Most of his recommendations were enacted into law, in spite of his decision not to force legislative action.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—Transmission line construction work that will cost more than half a million dollars was authorized today by Charles E. Carey, acting Bonneville administrator.

Carey signed a contract with the Parker-Schram company of Portland for erection of the 110,000-volt line from Vancouver to Eugene at a cost of \$120,932.40, and another with the General Electric company for fabrication of three transformers for the same substation near Vancouver at a cost of \$384,799.

Will Dedicate Church Organ

Remodeling of Leslie Also to Have Recognition, Sunday Services

Marking completion of the remodeling program at Leslie Memorial Methodist church and installation of the new Reuter pipe organ, two dedication services will be held Sunday, with Bishop Titus Lowe, Portland, to give the messages.

Reconstruction of the church, started December 26 and accomplished at a cost of about \$3000 including the organ, gives to the Leslie congregation a strictly modern Sunday school and church plant, outstanding feature of which is the sanctuary of gothic architecture.

The general public is invited to the dedication events Sunday, first of which will be the statutory ceremonies at 11 o'clock, in which Dr. Louis Magin, Salem district superintendent, will assist the bishop.

The organ dedication will be at 4 o'clock. Reuter organs are in use at the Presbyterian church here and at O. C. musical hall.

The new sanctuary, both restful and pleasing to the eye, employs insulate acoustical tile for the ceiling, dark oak finish woodwork and pean wood for the floor. It has a seating capacity of 350 with use of the side chapels and balcony.

Designed by Pastor

An unusual feature is the fact that the pastor, Rev. Dean C. Poindester, designed the entire project, then turned his work over to Lyle Bartholomew, architect, for detailed plans. James E. Emerson has been construction foreman.

The structure now contains 18 rooms for Sunday school use in addition to the basement dining room and state, a neat large parlor, women's parlor and kitchen. The old interior was so arranged that Sunday school facilities were practically nil and these classes were held in adjacent Leslie hall. Now this hall will be used for a recreation room, with the Leslie Boy Scout troop using the annex.

The remodeling includes also entirely new heating plant, plumbing and lighting, including a light from the tower exterior.

In recognition of completion of the project and Holy week, special services will be held at the church next week, as follows:

Monday night, victory dinner at 6:30 p. m. for all members and friends; Tuesday at 7:30 p. m., organ recital by Malcolm Meddler, Portland organist; Wednesday at 7:30 p. m., message by Rev. Robert Hutchinson, First Congregational church pastor; Thursday, 7:30 p. m., communion service and reception of new members.

Special Easter services will include baptism of children at 11 a. m.

Miss Ina Bennett is church organist and choir director. At the Tuesday recital, Kendall Teisner, Portland, will sing four numbers.

Mrs. Collins Free In Shooting Case

PENDLETON, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—The Umatilla county grand jury today absolved Mrs. Myrtle M. Collins, Cobbe Crossing, of blame in connection with the wounding of C. F. Collins, her estranged husband, in a shooting affray last February 22.

Mrs. Collins, who had been charged with assault with intent to kill but was freed pending developments, asserted the shooting was in self defense. Collins recovered and was released from a Walla Walla hospital some time ago.

Baker Chocolate Scion Murdered

PITTSBURGH, March 31.—(AP)—The victim of a YMCA dormitory slaying mystery was identified tonight by friends as Louis Marshall Baker, 47, scion of the Baker chocolate family of Winchester, Va., who spent a fortune and ended up on a WPA payroll.

Baker, once host to royalty and intimate friend of celebrities, died at noon in Shadyside hospital, refusing to the last to name the assailant who fatally beat him early Sunday in his YMCA room.

11,000 CCC Men Allotted Oregon

Summer Program Includes 55 Camps in State, Detroit Included

WASHINGTON, March 31.—(AP)—Oregon will have 55 CCC camps throughout the summer, only three less than last winter, the civilian conservation corps announced today.

Approximately 11,000 CCC enrollees will be housed in the camps, 17 of which will be located on national forests, two on state forests, three on wildlife refuges, four on soil erosion demonstration areas, six on federal reclamation projects, 13 on public domain, two on state parks and one in Crater Lake national park, Director Robert Fechner said.

He pointed out the summer program called for opening two new camps, re-establishment of seven abandoned camps and the closing of 12 existing camps.

The new camps will be at Monument, Grant county, and Disston, Lane county. Re-established camps will include: Willamette national forest, Marion county, Detroit; Deschutes national forest, Klamath county, Crescent lake; Wallawa national forest, Wallawa county, Enterprise; three in Deschutes county at Lapine and one in Crater Lake national park, Klamath county, Union creek.

Camps will be closed at Grants Pass, Cascade, Camp Sherman (Jefferson county), Sumnasho (Wasco county), Nyssa, three at Kerby (Deschutes), Charleston, Glenada, Medford and Kerby (Josephine).

BOSTON, March 31.—(AP)—General Robert E. Wood, recently named advisor on business relations to Secretary of Commerce Hopkins, declared tonight he was convinced it would be a "fine thing for our youth" to be forced to give "six months or a year" to the state "either in labor service or military service."

He made the assertion in a speech before the Young Men's Super club of Boston, an organization of young business executives, in which he asserted "it behooves all classes, whether business, labor or agriculture, to consider their duties and their obligations, the rights afterward."

"If the democracies cannot learn to impose on themselves some voluntary discipline, they may perish," said General Wood.
