Capitol Board to Close Its Offices

Turns Back \$53,086, Part Marked for Landscape Work on Grounds

The state capitol reconstruction commission passes into history today with the official termination of its work. The last legislative provided that the state board of control should complete remaining work on the new capitol group after April 1.

Of the \$2,500,000 state capitol fund, the commission turned back \$53,086 to the state. This is partially earmarked for additional landscaping work, for the purchase of light standards and the installation of flag poles.

The commission expended \$877,368 out of a \$1,000,000 state and federal fund available for the new library building.

A total of \$114,136 is being expended for the new state heating plant which is nearing completion at 12th and Perry streets.

Lawbreaker List Increases to 13

The list of local juvenile lawbreakers reached 13 Friday as Salem police took into custody another pair of 14-year-old boys to add to the 11 youngsters, two of whom were committed to the state training school, who were apprehended 10 days ago.

The boys admitted, according to police, to the theft of cigarettes from an automobile, theft of candy bars in a burglary of Busick's market, to entering the Gideon Stolz bottling works, and to stealing a case of milk bottles from the Capitol Dairies.

Three dozen assorted candy bars were found by officers in a mahogany on Cottage street, where the boys said they had been hidden. The milk bottles, they said, were sold to stores about town.

YWCA Benefited In H. Meyers Will

Trust Fund Portion Also Will Go to St. Paul's Episcopal Church

A permanent trust fund for the support of the Salem Young Women's Christian association was provided by the late Henry W. Meyers, whose will was admitted to probate yesterday. The probate petition estimated the value of his estate in Marion county at \$10,000 but gave no indication of the worth of property held in Washington and California.

The will leaves the entire estate in trust to Ladd & Bush Trust company with instructions to pay the widow, Ellen Edes Meyers, such sums from either income or capital during her life as she deems necessary for maintenance in her accustomed position. After her death the trustee is to pay \$100 a month to a brother, Joseph Donald Meyers, for the benefit of his daughter, Ellen Elizabeth Meyers, niece of Henry W. Meyers, until she reaches 20 years of age or marries, when she will receive a final payment of \$500.

After the trust for the niece terminates, the trustee is to pay \$5000 to St. Paul's Episcopal church for construction of a new parish home or to equip a new home if one has already been built. None of the money is to be spent on operation of the church itself.

The remainder of the estate will then go to the local YWCA in perpetuity, the fund to be known as the "Henry W. and Ellen E. Meyers Endowment fund."

Mrs. Meyers was yesterday named executrix of her husband's estate and M. L. Meyers, Alice H. Page and Leo N. Childs appraisers.

FSA Families Are Planning Gardens

Well planned gardens for families planning to move to the farm are being planned by the farm security administration live-at-home program in Marion county, reports Viola Shaffer, home management supervisor, Oregon building, Salem.

Gardens are planned to supply all fresh vegetables needed during summer months and provide enough additional produce to enable the homemaker to can not less than 26 to 30 quarts of tomatoes or juice and 30 to 40 quarts of vegetables for each member of the family, in addition to producing from 225 to 270 pounds of potatoes per person. Stored root crops and dried, vegetables make a wide variety available for the planning of attractive meals during winter months when fresh vegetables are dear.

After giving careful consideration to preferences of the family and the maximum vegetable requirements to provide an adequate year-around diet, the family garden is laid out to meet these specifications.

Farm security cooperators desiring assistance in planning their gardens may secure extension service and department of agriculture bulletins as well as other aid through the county farm security administration office here.

Income Taxpayer Deadline Tonight

Office Open to Midnight; Payments Received to Date \$1,500,000

Late income taxpayers, who thus far have been unable to file their tax reports for 1938 with the state, have until midnight today to get their returns in the mails or into the offices of the state tax commission here. The commission, which has been open each evening until 10 o'clock, announced Friday it would keep its offices open until midnight to accommodate late filers of returns.

Payments up to Friday night of personal income, corporate excise and intangibles taxes had aggregated \$1,500,000. This did not include heavy payments made in the Portland offices.

Taxpayers who file later than today will be subject to penalty and interest.

The tax commission estimated Friday that the three taxes would yield \$4,200,000 in Oregon this year opposed to \$5,400,000 in 1938.

Nye Retires From Service of State

Employed Since 1906; to Rest, Then Tour in Southwest US

Al Nye, 77, after 33 years of continuous service for the state, retired late Friday afternoon. He first entered the state service in August, 1906, as a clerk in the offices of F. I. Dunbar, secretary of state. He later was promoted to the position of state superintendent of mails. Nye served in this capacity until two years ago when he accepted the job of capital messenger.

At the time Nye became associated with the state there were only seven employees in the state department. He has the distinction of having attended every state fair held in Oregon.

Just before his retirement Friday afternoon fellow employees presented him with a crisp \$100 bill.

Nye said he would enjoy a needed rest, after which he would take an automobile trip through the northwest.

Nye's retirement was due to ill-health, resulting from an automobile accident a few years ago.
