

Conviction Is Upheld, Court

Dugger Must Spend Term in Multnomah Jail on Assault Count

The conviction of Cecil Dugger, Portland AFL teamsters union member, on an assault and battery charge, was upheld by the state supreme court here Tuesday. He was sentenced to serve a term of nine months in the Multnomah county jail.

Dugger, with Leon V. Wallingford, Chick Eitelman and William Martin, attacked and beat up Kenneth Puttkamer and Charles Borquist in December, 1937.

All of the men with the exception of Dugger pleaded guilty. Borquist, assisted by Puttkamer, was leading his truck at a picketed warehouse at the time of the attack.

Eitelman has been sentenced to serve a year in the Multnomah county jail. Wallingford and Martin have not yet been sentenced.

Trial Fair, Opinion
Justice George Rossman, in his opinion, held there was no "basis for believing that the defendant was not given a fair trial." The opinion affirmed Circuit Judge Jacob Kessler.

Huge Flying Boat Reaches England

SOUTHAMPTON, England, April 4.—(AP)—Pan American Airways' Yankee clipper, world's largest flying boat in service, headed the opening of commercial aviation between the United States and England when she alighted on the harbor here at 3:40 p. m. (7:40 a. m. PST) today at the end of a 5,500-mile inspection flight. It was uncertain tonight whether the clipper would retrace the southern route or fly the North Atlantic on the return trip. The big plane will be flown to Foyles, Ireland, tomorrow and may return to Southampton.

He said the history and nature of labor unions showed a union to exist must do certain things that the Oregon law forbids.

With arguments on demurrers finished, the three judges must decide next whether they have jurisdiction to hear the main case against the law.

Defendants include state, Multnomah county and Portland law enforcement officers.

Senate Votes to Permit Taxation, Public Employees

WASHINGTON, April 4.—(AP)—The senate approved today a bill to wipe out tax immunities enjoyed by state and federal jobholders, including judges and members of congress.

The supreme court ruled recently that the federal government had a right to tax salaries of state workers and that states could tax the pay of federal employees.

The bill, approved by a voice vote, asserted the intention of congress that such taxes should be collected but contained a prohibition against retroactive taxation. Salaries received prior to January 1, 1939, will not be taxable.

Aid for China Is Plea of Speaker

Stopping Munitions Flow Would Stop Slaughter Says Molly Yard

All the horrors of the war against China could be stopped within six months if the American people would stop shipping scrap iron, oil and airplane materials to Japan, Miss Molly Yard, executive secretary to the Far Eastern Student Service Fund, New York City, declared in a series of addresses here Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

She dwelt especially on the plight of education in China, and said that more than half the educational institutions faced the problem of taking care of students as a result of the war's destruction. Miss Yard was at the front with the 8th route army last summer.

Students offered to go to the front, but because China, striving for democracy, believes that it must have an educated people they offers to fight were refused. She pictured the hardships students have gone through to continue universities there, and told that 10,000 dropped handbills being relocated more than once to carry on, with classes actually conducted in dugouts to avoid bombing at hands of the Japanese. She cited one instance where students traveled 67 days and more than 1,000 dropped handbills to keep functioning as a school. At another place, 12,000 college students with no place to go set up the Youth Training Institute, in which the older boys teach the younger as well as pursuing their studies as best they can.

Students Also Teach
Even high school students, attending classes in the morning, spend their afternoons in the hospitals teaching the wounded to read and write; and their evenings in teaching adult education in classes.

She presented the high attitude of the Chinese as something that must be preserved for the world, and in this connection recalled that Chinese airmen, flying over a Japanese ship, dropped handbills showing their love for the Japanese people, rather than imperialistic bombs.

Miss Yard appealed to the youth especially to help the Chinese. She said \$10 in American money will keep a Chinese student in school a year.

She addressed both junior high schools, the senior high school student body and two gatherings at the First ME church while here. Tuesday night she spoke at Corvallis and today she speaks in Portland.

"It is hard to believe under the circumstances that the Chinese are ardent supporters of the League of Nations, but they are because they know how destructive modern war is and because they feel something similar to the league must be developed to save the peoples of the world," she declared.

US Engineers to Study Bay Ocean

C. B. McCullough, assistant state highway engineer, will represent Governor Sprague at a meeting with army engineers at Bay Ocean today to study the damage resulting to the Tillamook bay district from recent storms.

When the damage was first reported Governor Sprague sent telegrams to President Roosevelt and other federal officials.

Telegrams received from President Roosevelt suggested a cooperative program with federal engineers to study the damage and avert it. He recommended that the state, communities affected and the federal government join in the program.

State Librarian Conference Ends

200 Delegates Are Here for Varied Program; Capitol Is Seen

The statewide library conference closed late Tuesday afternoon following a program dealing with a discussion of recent books. A county librarians' conference is scheduled for today.

Tuesday forenoon's program included a tour of the capitol building, round-table discussions and addresses. A no-host luncheon was held at noon.

Approximately 200 librarians and library trustees attended the conference which was arranged by Miss Harriet C. Long, state librarian. The sessions were held in the new state library building which was dedicated Monday night.

Miss Long intimated that a similar conference probably would be held next year.

Librarians in attendance at the conference said the Oregon state library was one of the most modern on the Pacific coast.

Oregon Sales Tax Near, Hosch Says

BEND, April 4.—(AP)—Sooner or later, the people of Oregon are going to have a sales tax, Dr. J. F. Hosch, veteran Deschutes county legislator, told a civic club at an address here.

As a matter of fact, said Hosch, the 1939 legislature would have passed such a tax had it been presented earlier in the session instead of at the close.

"It's easy enough to spend money; the major problem is how to get it," Hosch declared, pointing out that about \$100,000,000 will be expended in the 1939-41 biennium.

At another point, he criticized Governor Sprague for vetoing a bill which would have provided free physical examinations for marriage license applicants.

Purebred Animal Licensing Is Due

Enrollment of stallions and jacks on the license lists of the state department of agriculture will be made during the next few weeks, Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the animal husbandry division, announced Tuesday.

The state law requires the licensing of all purebred animals used for public service every three years up to the age of 10 years, Dr. Lytle said. Licenses which have expired are now due for renewal. The fee is \$10, half of which goes to the veterinarian who examines the animal for soundness.

The registered Palomina breed of light saddle horses will be licensed for the first time this year. This is permitted by an amendment to the registration laws passed by the last legislature.

Approach County On Bang's Funds

Full US Indemnities to Halt May 1; State, County to Pay

Since full federal Bang's disease indemnity payments to Oregon cattle owners are scheduled to be discontinued after May 1, the state department of agriculture asked the county courts Tuesday to indicate what county funds will be available this year for indemnities.

Under the Bangs disease law passed by the last legislature, the state is authorized to pay owners \$4 for grade cattle and \$6 for registered purebred cattle, slaughtered under the statewide control program. The law also permits counties to pay as much as \$5 and \$7.50 to match state funds. Together, the state and county funds will be matched by federal funds after May 1.

Tests Soon Urged
Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the animal husbandry division, urged that all herds known to be infected at the present time should be tested and slaughtered before May 1. This would give owners more indemnity than later, when the federal government merely matches the state and county funds.

The testing program will be compulsory in all counties which have more dairy cattle than beef cattle. This makes it applicable to all of western Oregon with the exception of Jackson county.

Hotel Is Center For Blossom Day

The Marion hotel has been designated as headquarters for Sunday, the opening day of Blossom week, Chervians announced yesterday. This will afford a familiar landmark for many out of town visitors, thus putting them off to a good start on their tour of the Blossom route.

King Bing Harold Busick and a group of his Chervians, along with princesses for Salem's champion float in the 1938 Portland rose festival, will pose for the customary pre-blossom day pictures today. In the last several years, these pictures have been taken in a cherry orchard near Winona station, along the Salem-Dallas road.

Members of the state highway commission will meet with a group of logging operators in Portland today to discuss a law of the 1939 legislative session fixing a 10 percent tolerance for log haulers.

The bill was introduced by Senator George T. Chaney of Coos county. Chaney, along with Senators U. S. Balentine, Klamath county, and F. M. Francisovich, Clatsop county, will attend the session.

The legislation was requested by a large group of loggers, who said shifting of their loads and other conditions, had resulted in accidental violations.

Historic Jesuit Church At Desmet Is Burned

DESMET, Idaho, April 4.—(AP)—Historic Sacred Heart church of the Jesuit mission burned to the ground here today with the loss of valuable art treasures and pioneer handicraft.

The fire was attributed to a furnace explosion. The colorful structure was built in 1881.

Paper Firm Will Not Pay Interest

No Profit Shown in 1938, Debt Paid but Income Bondholders Wait

No interest will be paid income bondholders of the Oregon Pulp & Paper Co. for 1938 according to word received in Salem on Tuesday by local holders of the securities. Decision not to pay interest on the obligations was reached at a recent meeting of the board of directors.

The directors decided that the company had shown no profits in 1938 and that as a consequence, no available net income existed to pay on the bonds. Interest is cumulative.

Large holdings of the bonds are in this territory, bondholders having received the securities in exchange for preferred stock.

The company will meet its current maturities and interest on its underlying bond issue.
