Argument on Neutrality Amendment Under Way, Senate Committee

Johnson (R-Calif.), two veteran isolationists whose service goes back to the battle against American entry into the League of Nations, leaped to the attack.

"Where do you go from there?" Johnson demanded. "Doesn't that edge us into war?"

Stimson replied that America's vast resources and inaccessibility to attack were a shield against aggression by a nation already at war with another country.

Would Act Only If Nation Threatened

The discussion quickly veered to recent European developments. Johnson noted the formation of a "stop Hitler" bloc, approving its purpose, and emphasizing that Great Britain and France were attempting to bring Russia into the alignment.

"Now," he said, "suppose Russia, Great Britain and France take the field, the three great democracies of the world (his inclusion of Russia was pointedly satirical) do you want us to take the field with them?"

Stimson gave this answer: "Not unless the situation became dangerous enough to indicate that we would be the next victim. Then I would go in as fast as I could."

One Motor Going Faster, Testified

SEATTLE, April 5.—(P)—Nathan C. Price, Boeing Aircraft company engineering chief, testified before a federal air safety board today there was evidence to indicate one engine was going faster than others at the time of the straitliner crash at Alder, Wash., March 18 in which 10 died.

Price said an examination of the wreckage of the four-motored plane showed the bearings of motor No. 3 were burned and scored before the crash. He said he believed the damage was the result of overspeeding of the motors in flight.

Mills and Camps Closed by Strike

RAYMOND, Wash., April 5.—(P)—Lumber mills and logging camps were closed and longshore work on two ships was halted here today by a strike in Willapa harbor's lumber industry.

More than 1500 men were idle. Picket lines surrounded most operations and loading of lumber aboard the Grace line ship Coya and the Yamashita line's Cyoko Maru was halted. The Japanese ship sailed only partly loaded.

Britain Draws 'Ring' Tighter

Accord With Poland now More Complete; Scare Story "Explained"

liance against aggression "became effective" today after Polish Foreign Minister Joseph Beck, Chamberlain and Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, had held their third talk in two days.

Chamberlain was expected to make an announcement tomorrow in the house of commons on the progress achieved.

Poland and Britain were said to have "agreed on the principle of solving the Jewish question in Poland with the hope that practical measures will follow."

It was understood Poland in this plan wanted a loan for rearmament, provision of British colonial territory as a home for Polish Jews and a British agreement to replace League of Nations control of the free city of Danzig by a committee of one German, one Pole, and one representative of a third power, perhaps Britain of Sweden.

It was reported that Poland suggested that Rumania make minor frontier adjustments in favor of Hungary to facilitate cooperation by Poland, Hungary and Rumania in a Baltic-black sea alliance—an adjunct to the "stop Hitler bloc."

Seacoast-Interior Highway Is Urged

Group Will Fly Here to Campaign for Road in Southern Oregon

GRANTS PASS, April 5.—(P)—A new campaign to build a state highway from the seacoast to interior southern Oregon was launched today in an airplane flight of four men to a group of cities.

Boarding a plane here, Frank H. Seal, Dr. L. R. Pugh, M. E. Kelley and Joe Harrell flew over the proposed route along the Rogue river to Port Orford, thence to Bandon, Roseburg and back to Klamath Falls.

At each city they gathered data and urged chambers of commerce, county courts and forest service officials to get behind the move. Later they flew on to Eugene and were scheduled to proceed to Salem to discuss the proposal with state highway officials.

Ten thousand signatures were obtained several years ago to petition for a road from here to Gold Beach but the campaign failed. The only route now is the circuitous road from Roseburg to Coquille and there is no direct connection from the coast to the Rogue valley and Klamath basin.

Visiting Educator Says Swiss Alert

PORTLAND, April 5.—(P)—A Swiss professor, Paul Ganz of Basle university, came to America to talk mostly about art. He had to put art aside to keep up with questions about war or peace in Europe.

He advised the 400,000 Swiss in America not to be frightened because "we like to live in peace with our great neighbors but we are prepared to defend our liberty if we are attacked by one of our military neighbors."

Europe's fool is Adolf Hitler, he said, "and you never know what a fool will do—that is the menace that faces us."

KLAMATH FALLS, April 5.—(P)—The parents of Gordon Gloystein, 24-year-old adventurer, expressed fear for his safety today after a silence of a month from the time he was expected to reach Cordova, Alaska, at the end of a fishing and trapping cruise.

He wrote his parents that he was leaving Anchorage with a native boy as a companion. They were in a boat and had sufficient gasoline for a 600-mile trip, expecting to reach Cordova the first part of March.

Since then the parents have not heard from their son.

Employer Group Plans Expansion

More Oregon Units, State Units Through West Talked, Eugene

The general executive board of the Associated Employers of Oregon held its quarterly meeting at Eugene Tuesday.

Preceding the meeting, members of the executive board of the Better Eugene association were hosts to the directors of the state organization at a luncheon.

At the board meeting Gilbert O. Madison, general chairman, launched his program for 1939-40, as follows:

1. Inaugurate drive for 100 per cent membership in local units.
2. Organize and establish units at Astoria, St. Helens, Medford, Klamath Falls, Burns and Cottage Grove.
3. Encourage organization on a national scale.
4. Join with the Portland employers to uphold act regulating picketing.
5. Create interest in Portland to form a unit.

Following unanimous adoption of the program, Dan Hay, executive manager, was authorized to lay the program of organizing state units of the Associated Employers in Washington, California, Idaho, Utah and Montana. Mr. Hay will also attend the National Industrial conference in Los Angeles on May 8 and 9, as an official representative of the Associated Employers of Oregon.

Show Card Class Place Is Changed

The new class in show card writing offered for Salem merchants and their employees through the department of vocational training of the Salem public schools is being held at the vocational shops at the new senior high school and not at the old high building. T. T. Mackenzie, local director for vocational education, said last night. The class meets at the new shops, 14th and D streets, from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. on Wednesday and Friday nights.

The show card class is a vocational trade extension course sponsored jointly by the state board for vocational education, the department of vocational training of the city system and local merchants and is not a part of the WPA educational program. Enrollment will be limited to 16 persons, who will be charged a fee of \$2 each.

Giannini to Face Charge of Fraud

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—(P)—Fraud charges hurled at A. P. Giannini and the Bank of America by the securities commission brought quick denial today from Giannini.

The commission's San Francisco office filed suit to stop sale of Timetrust certificates. It named Giannini, chairman of the bank's directorate, L. M. Giannini, president, John M. Grant, president of Trans-America corporation among the defendants.

Others were the bank, Timetrust, Inc., and Meredith Parker, Ralph Wood and H. E. Blanchett, identified as directors of Timetrust. The commission asked the federal district court to enjoin sale of Timetrust certificates. They are contracts to buy Bank of America stock on the installment plan.

Plans Announced For Aquatic Pool

Bartholomew Is Retained by Silverton Council; Will Decide Site

SILVERTON, April 5.—Plans for a reinforced concrete swimming pool 45 by 110 feet with a bathhouse 20 by 110 feet, both designed to accommodate 150 persons as patrons of the pool at one time, were submitted by Lyle P. Bartholomew of Salem who was tonight retained by the Silverton city council to supervise the swimming pool program approved recently by the voters. Approval of this action by WPA is necessary.

The council will meet with Bartholomew at the city park Thursday morning to discuss the matter of location, probably in or near the park. G. R. Boatright, WPA engineer, said a WPA crew would be ready to start construction by April 13.

Charles Watson, appointed park superintendent at a \$10 a month salary, and the park committee, consisting of John Porter, Al Coote and L. S. Tucker, will meet Thursday at 6 p. m. to discuss park improvement.

It was decided at the meeting that George Hubbs, city recorder, would receive \$150 a month for clerical work in connection with the federal projects; Rex Albright, city attorney, \$600 for legal work and Bar & Cunningham, engineers, \$50 a month these amounts requiring approval of WPA.
