

Music Contest Is Here Today

10 High School Bands and Orchestras to Compete Starting 10 a.m.

Ten high school bands and orchestras from the Willamette valley and adjoining sections of the state will meet in Salem today for the northwest district competition of the Oregon music educators' association. In former years, all school bands from the entire state met at one of the colleges for all state contest. However, this year, due to the large number of bands, it was too large an undertaking for any one town.

This year the state is divided into four districts with contests being held in LeGarde, Medford, Salem, and Oregon City. The bands which receive the highest rating in these districts will be eligible to compete in the northwest regional contest in Portland, May 12-13, at which will be the outstanding high school bands and orchestras from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The contest, which will be held in the senior high school auditorium, will begin at 10 a.m. The first event will be the sm 11 ensembles and orchestras. At noon there will be a banquet in the high school cafeteria. From 1 to 4 will be the band contest and at 4 will be a marching band contest held on Olinger Field.

Three Judges Named

Judges for the contest are Andrew Loney, jr., supervisor of music, LeGarde schools, John Stehn, director of the University of Oregon band, Eugene, and Ferdinand Sorenson, professor of music, Portland.

Chairman of the district meet is Delbert Moore, music supervisor of the Corvallis schools and director of the Oregon State college symphony orchestra. Gordon Finlay, director of the host band is in charge of local arrangements. Admission to the contest is 25 cents.

Meeting May Eye Well Water Plan

Water Commission May Revive Discussion of Stayton Proposal

Discussion of well water possibilities as a means of augmenting Salem's water supply on Stayton island may be revived at tonight's meeting of the Stayton water commission. Chairman I. M. Doughton said yesterday, Manager Cuyler Van Patten, virtually recovered from his recent illness, will be present.

Doughton pointed out that a "water-or-no-pay" well drilling proposal from the Stayton Pump company of Stockton, Calif., had been made a special order of business for the February 17 meeting but action had been deferred because of the absence of the manager. Should the commission not accept the proposal, it might consider further development of the one successful well already drilled on the island.

Construction of the settling basin and screen chamber on the island, to remove sand from the water secured from the underground system, is proceeding rapidly and will be completed in time for use during the summer irrigation period, Doughton said.

Produce Growers Must File Labels

Box Marks' Registry Due June 14; Penalty for Label Misusing

On June 14 Oregon fruit and vegetable growers will be compelled to register their box labels with the county clerk and the state agricultural department under a new law approved at the recent legislative session, officials announced Thursday.

The law provides that growers must publish descriptions of their labels once a week for three consecutive weeks in the principal newspaper of the county in which they live.

Berry Growers Included

Any person using another's label will be subject to a 10-day to six months' jail sentence and a fine of 50 cents for each illegal container used.

For the second and subsequent offenses the jail term would be 30 days to one year and the fine \$1 to \$5 or each illegal container used.

The law also applies to berry growers.

Marion Townsites Formally Vacated

Historic Fairfield Town Recalled by J. E. Smith as Shipping Center

Two old-time Marion county townsites passed out of existence yesterday when the county court signed orders formally vacating the town plats of Silver Falls City and Fairfield. Signing one of the orders, Commissioner J. E. Smith remarked that he could remember when Fairfield had a blacksmith shop, a store, a residence and the Breyman grain elevator. Located at a steam landing, Fairfield was the shipping center for grain growers of much of the northwest part of the county. The plat was vacated at the request of the State Finance company and Donald B. and Helen DuRette, owners of all the property affected.

The state highway commission, which requested vacating of Silver Falls City, which it now owns as a part of Silver Falls state park, will remove all the "buildings" except the confectionery, which the present tenant will be permitted to occupy until his lease from the former owner expires. A county road and a state highway are omitted from the vacation order.

Ebeling Tells Chamber's Aim

National President Cites Real Work Being Done by Junior Group

"The junior chamber of commerce is not composed of a bunch of joiners, but of a bunch of doers," Philip C. Ebeling, Dayton, Ohio, national president of that body, told junior chamber members at a luncheon meeting at the Salem chamber of commerce rooms yesterday.

"We're not one of those groups that meets, eats, belches and adjourns," he added.

The junior chamber, organized 26 years ago, today has 532 member organizations in 44 states, and three territories, and has spread from the United States to 16 foreign countries, he recounted.

Education is Aim

He stressed the junior chamber as an organization of supplementary education for young men joined together in friendly spirit, devoted to inculcating civic consciousness in its membership by means of active participation in community, state and national affairs.

"Too many people prate about the privileges of citizenship and overlook the responsibilities," he said in urging the junior chamber objective of subjugating self to the general welfare.

Group's Work Outlined

This all may sound high minded

ed, but there can be no permanent solution to national and world problems without high mindedness, Ebeling avowed, holding that laws are no solution because "you can't legislate goodness into people."

He outlined briefly work the junior chamber has done and is doing in a national way. Present endeavors include the LaFollette bill on venereal disease, the congressional move for a temporary national defense committee along bipartisan lines and the nationwide survey of small business in cooperation with the SEC and other groups.

Oyster Industry Study Is Urged

Fish Commission Asked to Report on Lincoln Problem, Governor

Governor Charles A. Sprague wrote to the state fish commission Thursday urging that it conduct a study of the problems involved in rebuilding the natural oyster beds in Lincoln county and file a report with the executive department.

A bill of the recent legislature providing that these oyster beds be placed under the control of the Lincoln county court was vetoed by the governor.

"In my veto of this measure I expressed the opinion that the proper body to administer the native oyster beds in Lincoln county is your commission," Governor Sprague's letter read.

Asks Meeting

With Commission

"I further stated that I would place upon you the responsibility for carrying out the legislative act of 1931. I am, therefore, calling this subject to your attention with the request that you formulate plans for the study of the problems involved in the rebuilding of these oyster beds for their management on the expiration of the present lease and for practical work to increase the production of the beds and their expansion over the available area.

"Inasmuch as I confess ignorance of the commercial fishing industry, whose operations you su-

perwise, I would appreciate it if at some not too distant date your honorable body would meet in my office so that I might confer with you regarding the scope of your work and the problems you face.

Conner's Nephew Fatally Injured
