## Today's Menu Snacker Finds Inspiration To Piece

A frozen dessert will be the springy ending to today's meal.  
Endive salad  
Baked potatoes  
Saratoga veal chops  
Stewed celery  
Frozen banana delight

**FROZEN BANANA DELIGHT**  
½ cup mashed ripe bananas (2 to 3)  
6 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
½ cup cream, whipped  
¼ teaspoon vanilla  
¼ cup chopped nuts  
1 egg white

Use ripe bananas (yellow peel flocked with brown). Combine mashed banana, sugar and lemon juice. Add whipped cream, vanilla and nuts. Beat egg white until stiff enough to form peaks and fold into mixture. Place in freezing trays of automatic refrigerator and freeze until firm, 4 servings. Serve with lady fingers or sponge cake and hot coffee.

**GINGER PUFFS**  
1½ cups flour  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon soda  
¼ cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon ginger  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1½ teaspoons baking powder  
½ cup dark corn syrup  
¼ cup sour milk  
¼ cup melted butter  
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Stir in unbeaten egg together with corn syrup, sour milk and melted butter. Stir with spoon to make soft dough. Bake in muffin pans in hot oven (400 degrees) for 20 minutes. Serve with hot coffee.

## Odd Nut Included in Candy Recipe

That odd nut, the Brazil nut, that contains such a generous supply of oil, goes into an interesting fudge that is cooked only enough to heat it through. Next time you're in a candy-trying job make this:

**QUICK BRAZIL NUT FUDGE**  
4 squares chocolate  
2 tablespoons butter  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 pound sifted confectioner's sugar  
1-½ cup milk  
1 cup chopped Brazil nuts  
Whole nuts

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Stir in salt and vanilla. Stir in sugar alternately with the milk, keeping pan over hot water. Remove from heat and stir in chopped Brazil nuts. Pour fudge in a 7-inch square pan. Garnish with Brazil nuts, cut in halves. Let stand several hours. Cut in squares.

**APPLE BUTTER STACKS**  
1 recipe pastry  
1 cup apple butter  
1 four ounce package cream cheese  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
Roll pastry on floured board to ¼ inch thickness. Cut with large cutter into circles 4 or 5 squares. Prick and bake in hot oven (450 degrees) about 10 minutes or until light brown. Cool. Put circles together with a p/b butter between, using a stack of three for each serving. Spread cream cheese softened with lemon juice on top of stack. Serve at once.
