

Loyalty Issue Stirs up Town

Silverton's Business Men
Wondering how IEW
Gets That Way

SILVERTON — Were Silverton businessmen's faces red Tuesday? But not from embarrassment. All up and down Main street they had an old-fashioned "mad" on.

The cause was press stories appearing Tuesday morning to the effect that "After hearing talk of boycotting Salem last week due to a road controversy, Silverton business men Monday again heard talk in a similar vein, but this time it was directed at them. For their ascribed "lax attitude and poor support of the field project and local baseball teams, a majority of local business men" were criticized in a resolution adopted here Friday night by the Silverton local of the Industrial Employees' union.

"An article printed in a Salem newspaper not long ago," the statement declared, "gave credit to the Silverton chamber of commerce, backed by business men, for purchasing property now known as McGinnis field."

Credit is Disputed
"Asserting the members were 'raided,'" the statement added, "it was pointed out if it hadn't been for the mill men making an outright gift of the field to the city, it would still be cow pasture."

"But where," asked one Silverton businessman after another Tuesday, "is the \$35 I paid toward the park?"

Records show that at the time the ball park was purchased, the business men report, the business houses in Silverton raised in actual cash \$150. Besides this, they pointed out, the majority of business houses had season tickets, they subscribed to the advertising appearing on the ball park fence, and were even now subscribing to the advertising for this year's program.

Seek Explanation

When questioned Tuesday night, T. T. Leonard, president of the Silverton chamber of commerce, stated that he really had no comment to make.

"Perhaps," he added, "we will ask a committee from the IEW to appear before the chamber to tell us how we have failed to support the ball club."

Illegal Fish Sale Charged to Five

ROSEBURG, April 20 (AP) — With the arrest of a fifth person, C. W. Parker, Roseburg garageman, an inquiry into the alleged sale of illegal salmon to the Roseburg Rod and Gun club for an annual bake last June was ended today by District Attorney J. V. Long.

Three others, Frank Bennett, Eugene Ervin Davis, Winchester, and Stuart Taylor, Coquille have pleaded guilty and are awaiting sentence by a Reedsport justice court, while W. J. Beecroft, commercial fisherman, is yet to have his trial completed.

Parker was chairman of a committee that bought the salmon and he was charged with possession of illegally caught fish. Davis and Taylor were alleged to have caught the fish in closed waters and Bennett was alleged to have sold the catch to the club. Beecroft is charged with making an illegal bill of sale and Parker was accused of buying the fish.

Reorganization to Start Soon, Rumor

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP) — Reports reached Capitol Hill today that President Roosevelt was considering transferring the RFC and other government lending agencies to the commerce department in the first reorganization move under authority granted him recently by congress.

The contemplated reorganization order, which some legislators said they expected to be issued next week, also might include the Federal Housing Administration and Home Owners Loan Corporation, thus consolidating major business recovery agencies under one command, it was said.

Angler Employing Gun Device Upon Line Is Scolded

GRANTS PASS, April 20 (AP) — The fishing purists scorned Douglas Talbot of Fruitdale but the justice court jury let him off with a reprimand.

State police arrested Talbot, who caught the largest Chinook salmon on the upper Rogue river last year, on a charge of angling with a net line. They arrested his tackle included a device whereby a tug on the line by a fish would explode a gopher gun.

The angler's defense was that the line was not unattended because he was always within earshot of the report. The district attorney replied the law specified an angler must hold the rod in his hand.

"This jury recommends that any device firing a cartridge for a signal be prohibited," the jury commented. "Its use is not considered good sportsmanship." Talbot promised to destroy the device.
