"When you stop, it looks as if the road were moving on a head of you, the crickets are so thick," he said. When Pitts visited the Warm Springs reservation Wednesday afternoon, the cricket horde were still two miles from the agency and doing little harm as the land they were on was largely dry grass and rocks, he reported. Three Permits Asked—Power companies filed three applications with the county court yesterday for permits to extend their lines along county roads. The Mountain States Power company asked for permission to string a 1119-foot extension line on county road 862 southward from a point one-half mile west of Shaw. The Portland General Electric company requested a franchise for a 660-foot extension on and from county road 847 southward from its intersection with state secondary highway 192 and for another line on county road 844 extending north to its intersection with the same state highway.
