## Morleys Seek to Retain Properties

**Silverton Plaintiffs Will Be Defendants in Suit in Circuit Court**

F. M. and Mabel Morley resorted to circuit court action yesterday in an attempt to halt proceedings in Silverton justice court for possession of property they now occupy there. They named as defendants Clorinda A. and Roscoe Davis Ames personally and as executors of the Samuel Ames estate, Noris Ames, Laura Allen and Constable A. M. Amo of Silverton.

The Morleys' complaint recites that they mortgaged the property, lot 2, block 2, and certain land adjoining, in Skalle and McIntosh's addition, Silverton, to Samuel Ames and he obtained a foreclosure decree and sale order in 1935, buying the property himself for \$3300. In 1936 Norris Ames, acting as agent for Samuel Ames, agreed to extend the redemption period and to take \$2500, later reduced to \$1500, payable at \$15 a month, in full settlement of the claim against the property, the complaint avers.

The defendants are asserted to have repudiated their contract and instituted the justice court action to gain possession of the property.

## Eggs Are Graded Under new Names

Oregon housewives will have to get out of the habit of calling eggs "specials, extras or standards," the department of agriculture said Thursday, in pointing out that a changing egg grades now is effective.

Special eggs will be known as grade AA, extras as grade A, standards as grade B, while a new designation permits the sale of soiled eggs as "grade B, soiled." Grades which are not permitted to be sold at retail, will be called grade C.

Size designations will be over-size, large, medium, small and undersize.  
Director of agriculture J. D. Mick said the grades are changed to "improve consumer understanding," and to conform with standards which the federal government probably will adopt.

# Black V. Stith Case in Jury

## Judge McMahan Concludes April Program Here, Moves to Albany

Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan concluded his April term jury trial program when the case of Black vs. Stith reached the jury yesterday. Next Monday he will begin a two weeks series of trials at Albany, then will return here for May term proceedings. He has tentatively arranged to have all cases for the new term set for one day with the plan in mind of trying them in the order to be listed, as rapidly as possible.
