Actor Puts on Show for Reichstag; Members' Laughter Derisive

XIII of his 21-point reply to president Roosevelt's peace appeal. He concluded the point with this sentence:

"I can assure you, Mr. Roosevelt, that I am steadfastly determined to see to it that not only now but for all future time no German shall ever enter a conference defenseless, but that at all times and for ever every German negotiator should and shall have behind him the united strength of the German nation, so help me God."

Anglo-German Naval Treaty is Abrogated

Other bedlams were raised when he said Germany does not have the slightest feeling of inferiority toward Britain and when he announced the end of the Anglo-German naval treaty and of the German-Polish non aggression pact.

His references to Poland were greeted with cries of "pu! pu!"—the German equivalent of a Bronx cheer.

After speaking for an hour and a half, Hitler got around again to President Roosevelt's telegram.

He listed the questions which he found in the peace message and replied singly to each, introducing each reply with the same word, "antwort,"—answer. He intoned the word in such a derisive way that every time he repeated it his deputies and the galleries united in hearty laughter.

clinic held in the county. The association was formally organized in June, 1932.

Following a short talk by Governor Sprague, Dr. Ira Mannville of the Oregon Medical school gave the address of the evening on "An Apple a Day Keeps the Doctor Away." Dr. Mannville has attained national recognition for his research on the nutritive value of the apple and other representative fruits and vegetables available for the average American's diet.

He stated that flesh plays the important role in diet of every frontier era, followed by the increase of cereals with the coming of civilization. Fruits and vegetables only come with the increase of storage and transportation facilities.

He pointed out that the value of the apple and other fresh foods in the diet is not the actual mineral content, or the vitamins contained, but what it does in making available the minerals found in the other foods in the diet.

Portland Cleaner Grand Jury Finds

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—Gambling in Portland has been halted and prostitution is at a minimum, the Multnomah county grand jury reported today.

The grand jury, after a month-long investigation following a ministerial assault on alleged immorality, declared the city administration "can prohibit gambling and keep vice within a pale of decency" if it desires.

The police department and city administration were reprimanded for past control practices, which Mayor Joseph K. Carson said had been discontinued in favor of a "relentless and unceasing warfare against prostitution, without regulation or condemnation in any manner."

Fight Highlights Inter-Union Row

SEATTLE, April 28.—(AP)—Police halted a 15-minute fight between rival fishing union members today and arrested six persons, including two injured men.

Trouble started when a delegation from the CIO-affiliated Alaska Fishermen's union approached a pier where several cannery tenders were berthed. They were met by a group affiliated with the Cannery Tenders' union, an AFL organization.

C. H. Bowman, 33, a negro, was taken to city hospital with a head injury, and Robert Francisco, 25, a Filipino, received a knife gash in his left leg. Both were booked at the police station on open charges, as were four other Filipinos.

Willamette Wins Medalist Honors

Willamette university's golfers won team medalist honors in the Oregon intercollegiate tournament at the Lake Oswego course Friday and moved into the finals in team match competition, defeating Linfield college handily.

Orville Beardsley of Willamette tied for individual medalist with Wes Bernier of Pacific university, but Bernier shot a phenomenal 70 on Oswego's mountainous course Friday afternoon to win the playoff in that contest.

Pacific and University of Portland tied in their afternoon match and are to play nine holes more this forenoon, the winner meeting Willamette in the finals. The Willamette team, coached by John Varley, includes Beardsley, Al Cook, Fred Nicholls and "Bunny" Bennett.

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Answer Is 'No' To Roosevelt

Return of Danzig, Route to East Prussia Are Some of Demands

and the other states of the American continent."

He disclosed for the first time "my one and only offer" to Poland concerning the Free State of Danzig and Pomerania (the Polish Corridor), which he said Poland rejected.

The terms of the offer were: Return of Danzig, a part of Germany before the world war, as a free state into the framework of the German state; a sovereign German route and a railway line at Germany's disposal across the Corridor, connecting East Prussia with the rest of Germany; a free harbor at Danzig for Poland; acceptance of present boundaries between the two countries as final; a 25-year non-aggression treaty; and a guarantee of the independence of Slovakia by Germany; Poland and Hungary.

Cancellations of the 1935 naval pact with Britain, which limited the German navy to 35 per cent of the tonnage of Britain's fleet, and of the German-Polish non-aggression pact were delivered to the London and Warsaw governments.

Of the naval pact, Hitler said in his address:

"Since England today, both by the press and officially, upholds the view that Germany should be opposed under all circumstances and confirms this by the policy of encirclement known to us, the basis for the naval treaty has been removed."

Senator Borah, (R-Ida.), ranking minority member of the foreign relations committee attracted attention. Borah said it seemed to him that Hitler himself regarded the speech as "ending the matter of further world peace discussions."

Speaker Bankhead called the reply "specious and unpromising" and said that while it "contained some general desires upon his part to preserve peace in Europe and the world" it was "nevertheless filled with veiled threats" and "in no measure affords any assurance of stability and peace in Europe in months to come."

ALBANY, April 28.—(AP)—The caterpillar epidemic reached peach orchards in the Albany district today and County Agent Floyd C. Mullen warned that unless pruning of infested limbs and spraying was started quickly it might become impossible to control the pests.

In the Tennessee district near Lebanon proper spraying has controlled the insects, he said.

Vessel Picketed, Carlton Dispute

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—(AP)—The Calmar line freighter Ver-mar lay idle on the waterfront today when longshoremen refused to pass a CIO lumber workers picket line.

Demanders of the cargo owners and ship agents that Oregon's new union-control law be invoked brought no apparent action. The law provides that picketing may not occur unless a majority of employees agree to it.

The dispute started at Carlton earlier this week when the Engle & Worth sawmill was picketed by CIO lumber workers protesting discharge of three employees and seeking an increase in their 42½¢ an hour wage scale. Pickets withdrew when authorities ruled they were violating the union-control law.

Rynearson Happy On Road Proposal

EUGENE, April 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's proposal for a gigantic federal highway program is "exactly what we have been working for," Carl Rynearson, Cottage Grove, said today.

"I am naturally very happy over the announcement released by President Roosevelt," said Rynearson, manager of the Pacific Highway association. "We felt that our efforts toward having the Pacific highway in Oregon declared a military road were timely to say the least. With the army on record for the Pacific highway as a road of first priority, we feel that we have good reason to be happy."

Roadman Drowned Before Co-Workers

NORTH BEND, April 28.—(AP)—White co-workers tried fruitfully for a rescue, Harold "Pete" Peart, 32, Couille, swam for 10 minutes and then drowned today after falling 149 feet from a bridge into Coos bay.

Peart, a member of the state highway crew painting the bridge, was carried to sea by a rushing ebb tide. A high wind carried planks, tossed by fellow workers, in the opposite direction. The body was not recovered.

Fund Is Included For Tongue Point

WASHINGTON, April 28.—(AP)—Representative Mott (R-Ore.) said today he had been advised the house appropriations committee had included \$500,000 in the 1940 navy department supply bill to start construction of a \$1,500,000 naval airbase at Tongue Point, Ore.

Trial Ends When Defendant Tries To Take Own Life

THE DALLES, Ore., April 28.—(AP)—A large-calibre rifle bullet, fired through the left lung of Miss Lurene Dunsmore, abruptly ended a family property suit trial today.

Dr. Paul Vogt said Miss Dunsmore had a "fighting chance" to recover. He quoted her as saying she shot herself shortly before she was to testify in the trial, in which three brothers and a sister contested her right to a 133-acre ranch deeded by her late mother.

The incident caused Circuit Judge Alvin L. Sweek, Pendleton, on motion of the plaintiffs, to dismiss with prejudice the suit to set aside the deed.

Little Hope Held For Halliburton

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—(AP)—Little hope Richard Halliburton and his crew of 14 aboard a Chinese sea junk survived a storm in the eastern Pacific ocean last March 24, was expressed here today by officers of the liner President Coolidge, on arrival from the Orient.

The last radio message from Halliburton's craft to the Coolidge, received late on March 23, and telling of a battle with the sea, but revealing also an effort to laugh off any fears, was disclosed by Captain Dale Collins, chief officer of the Coolidge.

It read: "Southernly gales. Squalls. Lee rail under water. Wet bunks. Hard tack. Bully beef. Having wonderful time. Wish you were here instead of me."

The message was signed by Halliburton's skipper, Captain Jack Welch of San Francisco.

Henry E. Copeland Services Sunday

WOODBURN—Henry Edwin Copeland, 68, passed away in Los Angeles Wednesday, April 26. He is survived by his brothers, Charles O. of Marshfield, Ore., Rev. T. L. Copeland of San Jose, Calif., A. F. Copeland of Seattle; sister, Mrs. Emma J. Harvey of Woodburn, and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Copeland was born in Iowa and at the age of 20 moved with his parents to Woodburn where he made his home for several years. Later he spent his time in Alaska and eastern Washington and for the last 25 years in southern California.

Funeral services will be held at the Ringo chapel at 2 p. m. Sunday. Rev. H. R. Gay of Portland will officiate. Interment in Belle Pass cemetery in Woodburn.

Enlistments Aid In Jobs Problem
