Dr. Parr touched upon the problem of differences in capacity, and suggested cooperative activities ought to be substituted for competitive activities, and that schools should teach, not preach, the honorableness of all vocations.

Supt. Putnam emphasized the practical application of the theories discussed at the conference, and after admitting that teaching good citizenship might require a different method for every child, said the ideal of obedience to law and order might be taught with lasting benefit to all.

President Churchill delivered the address of welcome. The college choir sang three numbers.

law which already had resulted in clearing pickets from the mill on the ground that less than half the employees were involved.

Another dispute brought a suit in circuit court by a motion picture operators' union asking the right to picket the circle theatre because of wage cuts. The operators do not constitute a majority of employees and under the law they could not picket.

It was indicated the theatre suit might be combined with another suit recently filed by a group of unions challenging the constitutionality of the union control law but that in any event court consideration of the first suit would be delayed pending disposal of the theatre operators' action.

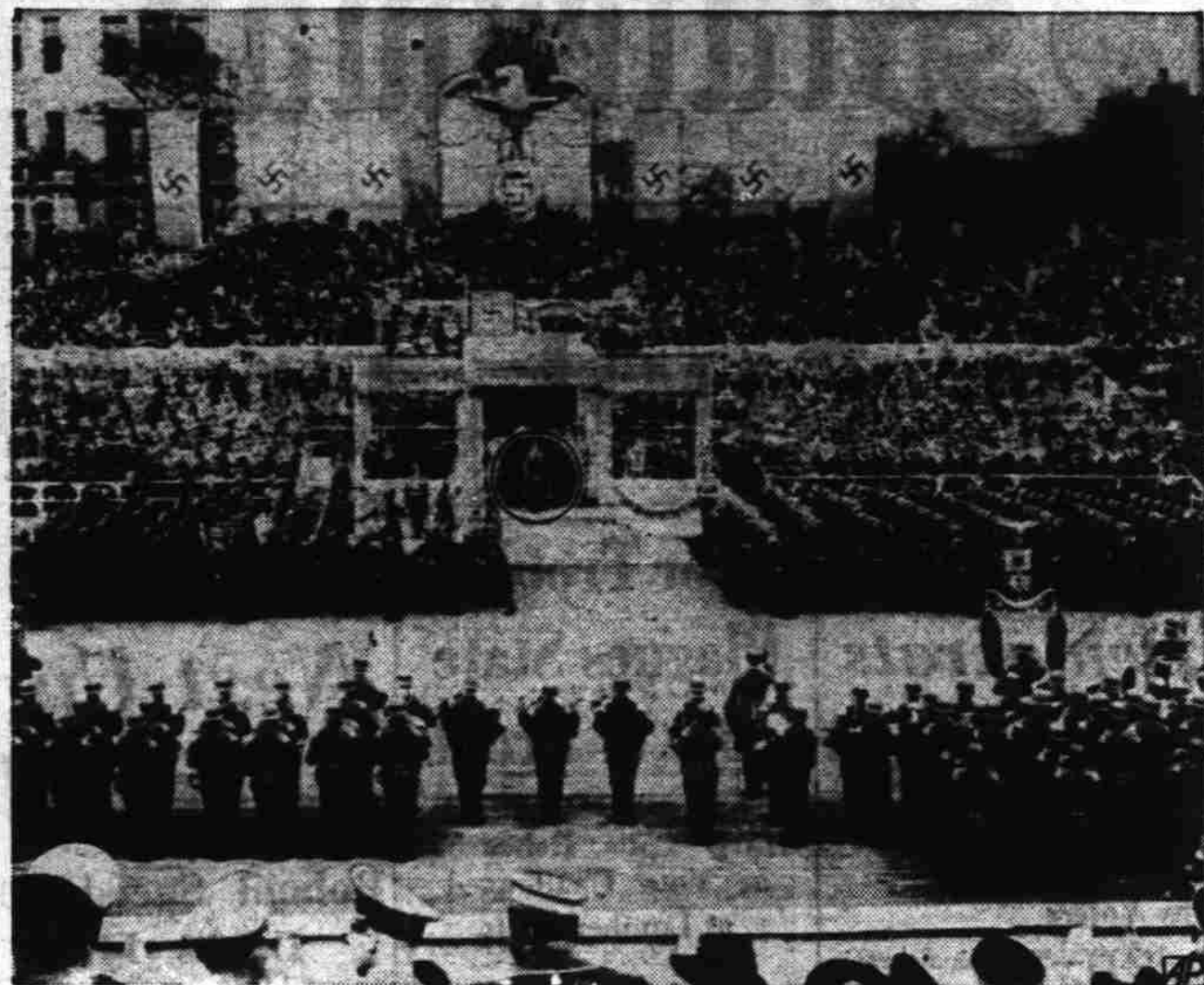
Steeves Speaker At 40-8 "Wreck"

10-hour shifts now worked by the members.

The city has averaged close to \$1000 per month for each of the four months of this year in collections on overtime parking tags, the largest monthly income that has ever been derived here from that source, but parking meter advocates claim that figure would

be at least tripled under the meter system.

There are a total of 37 cities in the United States which now use parking meters, at least 12 of which have less population than does Salem. Marcus Hook, Pennsylvania, with a population of 5000, has them, as do such cities with population density corresponding to Salem's as Bakersfield, Calif., Zanesville, Ohio, and Sharon, Pennsylvania.

Due also for final consideration of the council will be the acceptance of bids for a digger and a flusher truck. It was understood yesterday that the sewer and street committees, which have been studying the digger bids, will recommend acceptance of the low bid of A. C. Hagg, local concern, for an American digger.

Driest April Is Virtually Certain

PORTLAND, April 29.—(AP)—Where?

Where was all that April rain? Most people knew it was pretty dry but the weather bureau said tonight that unless the skies poured it down tomorrow—which isn't in prospect—April would be the driest of her kind since the bureau started keeping records here in 1871.

Rainfall through today totaled only .54 of an inch, which is .26 of an inch less than the previous low April of record—in 1926 and 1936, Normal is 2.87 inches.

honor at the arrival, reviewing the flotilla from the deck of the battleship Tennessee.

Later Mayor LaGuardia and a delegation of fair officials boarded the battleship New York, the squadron flagship, to extend the city's official welcome.

The next-ranking activity was extensive preparations for the visit of President Roosevelt, who will officially open the fair 3½ hours after the gates swing wide. The president will make a short speech to an expected 100,000 special guests in the fair's "court of peace" at 10:30 a. m. (PST) tomorrow.

The event will be picked up by television—the first time an American president has been televised—and the speech will be broadcast throughout the world by all major networks.

Parade Due Here Friday Preceding Pacific-WU Doubleheader

They'll be parading down State street when they come; they'll be tootin' and a blowin', when they come.

For it's a parade, led by the Willamette university band, trailed by the Willamette university Letterman's club, and sponsored by the Salem Athletic council. It's set for about 1 p. m. next Friday, and the occasion is the commemoration of the 100th birthday of baseball.

Mayor W. W. Chadwick is expected to issue a proclamation Monday, authorizing observance of the day by the city of Salem. His honor, who'll be "Wild Willy" for the day, has also been nominated to hurl the opening pitch for the Willamette-Pacific doubleheader that is slated to begin at 1:30.

"Sluggo" Snell, keeper of the Oregon archives, will waggle the willow in an effort to park "Wild Willy's" pitch out of Sweetland park, and should he miss Bruce "Backstop" Baxter is expected to stop the thing.

Local civic clubs, headed by SAC Chairman Tom Hill, are sponsoring the celebration, and are urging members to enter cars in the parade. It will be Salem's salute to Abner Doubleday and the great all-American game he is credited with creating 100 years ago this summer. All over the United States baseball centennial days are being observed, and Salem civic leaders mean to make Salem's part a worthy one.

McKenzie Route Reopening Eyed

BEND, April 29.—(AP)—An encouraging report that snow on the McKenzie pass route between here and Eugene was no deeper today than on May 24 last year came from a highway field party of Harlan Noel and Newton Perry.

Surveying the possibilities of opening the route, Perry and Noel ascended the summit and reached the Eugene slope. They found the big cut of the east approach to the lava fields blocked with 15½ feet of snow and four feet at the Deschutes-Lane county line, which is the Cascade divide. A short distance west, the snow was much deeper, however.

Plans for opening the route may be discussed at the May 3 highway commission meeting at Portland.

SEATTLE, April 29.—(AP)—Multnomah Athletic club, of Portland, carried away two out of three possible titles tonight in the first annual far western AAU swimming championships at the University of Washington pool.

The Portland swimmers took the combined men's and women's team championship with 62 points. Washington Athletic club, of Seattle, only other entry in this classification, scored 50.

A total of 37 points also gave Multnomah the women's championship, followed by the favored Los Angeles Athletic club, with 30; the Washington Athletic club, with 21, and the Oakland Women's club, with 8.

The men's championship went to WAC with 29 points. Multnomah was second with 25; attached swimmers totaled 21 points for third.

Charge WPA Man With Beating Boy

McMINNVILLE, April 29.—(AP)—A brutal beating of a 14-year-old boy with a watercooled rope resulted today in formal charges of assault and battery against a 46-year-old father, Fred R. Pierce, Newberg WPA worker.

Pierce was put in the county jail after William Zosel, state patrolman, brought the boy to the Yamhill county health department, where an examination showed a mass of red welts, back bruises and an injured left arm. Sheriff G. W. Manning said Pierce admitted beating the boy after lowering window shades at their home and locking the doors. The mother is dead.

City Hall at Bend Will Be Dedicated

BEND, April 29.—(AP)—Gov. Charles Sprague, touring central Oregon with the board of control, will stop here Monday to participate in dedication of Bend's new city hall, nearing completion as a WPA project. The governor, Earl Snell, secretary of state, and Walter E. Pearson, state treasurer, will speak at a banquet.

Further Defenses Seen on Columbia

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—New plans to strengthen the defenses of the Columbia river in addition to creation of a naval air base at Tongue Point have been drafted.

Tying in with the air base, for which \$1,500,000 was authorized by congress, the plans were discussed reluctantly by army officers.

However, it is known that a long-range program is in mind including additions to the armament at Fort Stevens. Rep. James Mott (R-Ore.), close friend of many admirals and generals, understood that at least one new giant coast defense gun would be added and that anti-aircraft batteries were planned.

The congressman hinted that if the program in mind were carried out, the defenses of the Columbia would be in "pretty good shape."

Visiting Rulers To See US Arms

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—The United States will stage an impressive parade of its military might for the leaders of two friendly foreign nations soon to visit this capital.

The state department, announcing details of arrangements for welcoming the king and queen of England in June and the president of Nicaragua next week, disclosed today that scores of planes, 30 tanks and 5,000 troops would take part in the ceremonies of greeting the visitors.

The displays on the two occasions are to be identical, that on next Friday for President Somoza of Nicaragua serving... although not intended in that way... as a rehearsal for the greeting to be given King George and Queen Elizabeth.

LaGrande Bakes at 95; Second Hottest April

LA GRANDE, April 29.—(AP)—An over-worked thermometer sent the mercury up to 95 degrees here Friday, the second hottest April day in history. It was cooler today. An April day in 1919 recorded 99 degrees.

Ride on Bicycle Fatal To Fireman of Ship

NORTH BEND, April 29.—(AP)—A bicycle gave James W. Denny, 21, ship fireman, a fatal notion. He decided to ride it and collided with an automobile, killing himself.

Kite-Flying Boy Fouls Powerline

PORTLAND, April 29.—(AP)—A kite-flying boy caused some grief for a few electricians. His kite's tinsel tail fouled a 24,000-volt power line, causing a brief interruption in service as far south as Salem and north to St. Helens. The lad was not hurt.

Portland General Electric officials here said the only effect in Salem was a momentary dimming of the lights about 5 p. m.

Skeleton Deemed Mystery Solution

MARSHFIELD, April 29.—(AP)—A seven-year-old mystery of the disappearance of Clarence Griffith, then 32, on a lone hike through the woods from Marshfield to Charleston was believed solved today with discovery of a skeleton by Walter Lawhorn, Coos county timber cruiser.

In dense underbrush three miles south of here, Lawhorn came upon the remains, clothing of which apparently checks with that of Griffith, Chief of Police Mat Coy said. It was believed he became exhausted. He was not familiar with the woods, having come here but a short time before from White River, Ark., where his widow returned.

Brothers of Boy Victim in Crash Kill Negro Driver

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., April 29.—(AP)—Lee Snell, negro taxi driver, was shot to death on a highway near here today while being taken to jail, and Constable James Durden told a coroner's jury the slayers were two brothers of a boy fatally injured by Snell's taxi several hours earlier. Durden identified the two as Everett and Earl Blackwelder. Snell had been arrested after the death of Benny Blackwelder, 12, who was struck by the taxi while riding a bicycle.

The constable reported the men, armed with a shotgun and rifle, overtook him and his prisoner west of the airport on the Daytona Beach-Deland highway, blocked the road and forced him to halt. He said he resisted but was overpowered.

Then, said the constable, Earl Blackwelder shot Snell with the rifle and Everett fired a shotgun into the negro.

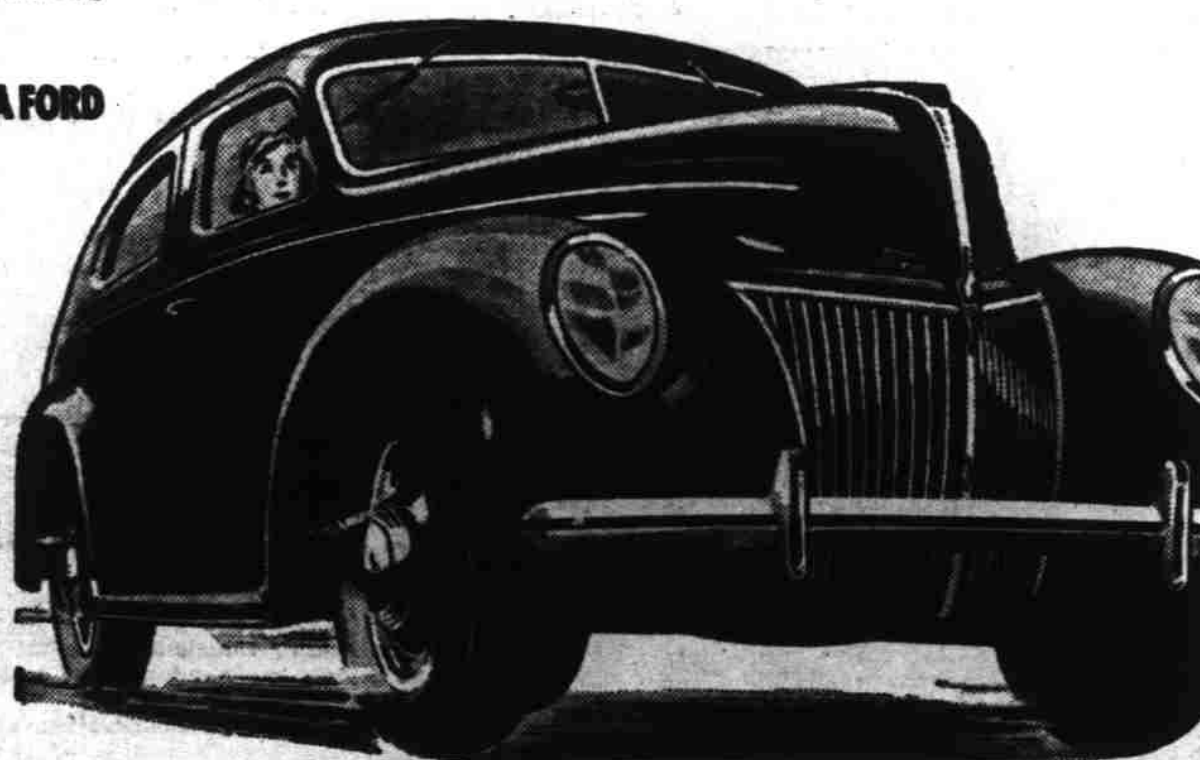
