**Chamber of Commerce to Ask Highway Group for Relocation**

INDEPENDENCE—Dr. George C. Knott called attention of the chamber of commerce at its meeting Tuesday night to the fact that two lives have been lost on the highway in North Independence within less than a year. He stated that he knew both car drivers personally and thought they were careful drivers. He called attention to the fact that the speed limit signs are at the full close to the business district and not out at the city limits and that drivers would naturally drive faster after passing these signs.

The members present voted to instruct the secretary to send a letter to the state highway commission asking that the speed sign be moved to the city limits.
