Riggs Decision Affirmed Here

Judge Lewelling Effects Formal Decree Upon Oral Ruling

Formal decree was handed down by Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday effecting his recent oral decision in favor of Adella C. Riggs in her suit against Louise Riggs and the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

The decree sets aside satisfactions of mortgages by the plaintiff recorded in three Oregon counties, reinstates a mortgage on 104.73 acres of land in Washington county, a lot in Eugene and a lot in Portland and grants her judgment for \$4500 principal and \$350 attorney fees against the defendant Riggs. A payment of \$4062.37 made into court by the insurance company is awarded to plaintiff in partial satisfaction of the judgment, with the balance to be met by foreclosure of the real property.
