### Carload Hops Sold, 23 Cents

California Growers Dispose of 110 Bales 1937s at 41/2 Cents

Moderate activity has characterized Oregon hop markets the past week, reports the USDA Weekly Hop Market Review, with sales of spot hops including a carload of 1938 clusters which netted producers 23 cents per pound. No 1937 hops were reported sold.

Trade advises indicated that contracts covering several hund red bales of 1939 crop regular type clusters were written in Ore gon during the past week at 20c to 21e per pound, net to producers. As the period ended, further bids for contracts of 1939 hope were reported being made by dealers in this state, at 20c to 21c per pound, net growers. Oregon producers were not pressing remaining supplies of 1938 hops for sale.

This tended to impart steadiness to the general market situation and to offset the slow current inquiry. Weather conditions continued quite favorable for the new

crop, according to trade advices.

Washington hop markets were rather quiet but remained steady No sales of spot hops were reported. Trade reports indicated that around 500 bales of 1939 crop hops were contracted the past week in the Yakima valley district with prices reported at 22c per pound, net growers, although this was not confirmed.

Offers of 24 cents per pound for "seedless" type of 1939 hope were reported being made by dealers in that area, and options were being asked at 25c per pound, but no business was reported. Training of vines has be gun in many Yakima valley yards and good stands are reported Weather conditions were reported as very favorable.

California Report California hop markets were quiet but maintained a steady to firm tone. With all 1938 crop supplies owned by growers pledged under government loans, producers were holding these lots at around 24c-25c per pound. A few small scattered lots moved to dealers at around these prices and growers also sold 110 bales of 1937 crop hops at 4 1/2 per pound No further contracts covering 1939 hops were reported by growers. Most California producers have made "first" contracts covering at least a portion of their prospective crops. Dealers re-ported that small lots of regular 1939 crop clusters could still be contracted at around 226-23c per pound, while 25c-26c was being asked for limited quantities of seedless hops for future delivery. Ideas as to prices were around 21c for regular hops and 23c-24c for seedless. Weather was quite favorable for new crop development with growers both in the Eacramento valley and coasta counties reporting unusually good conditions for the season of the year. Recent dry weather has reduced danger from downy mildew.




