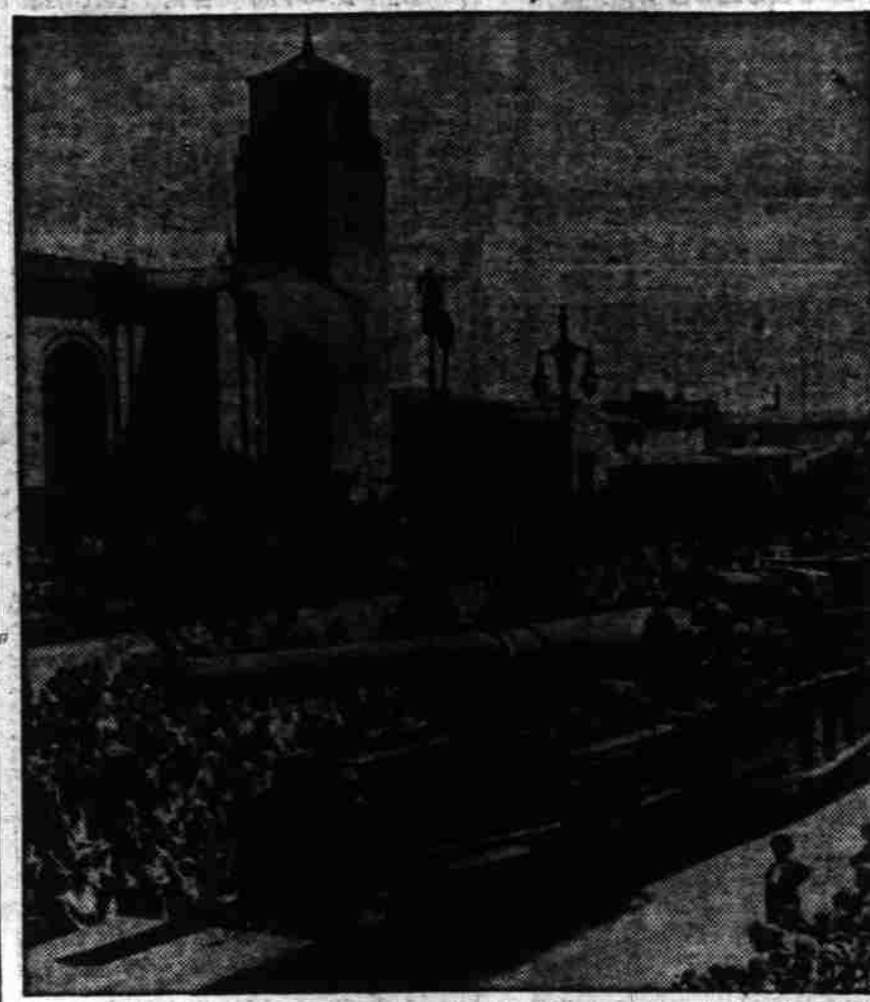

# Quelle Cafe Here To Be Remodeled

## Exterior Will Be Bright; More Space Occupied, Add Dining Room

Another ultra-bright spot in Salem's "gay white way" is promised when remodeling of the Quelle cafe, scheduled to begin a week from Monday, is completed. The restaurant will close for refitting of the main dining room Sunday night, May 14. Work on the new kitchen, on the east side of the building at 440 State street, has been under way for some time.

The new front, of glass brick and Carrara finish, will be made distinctive by a large neon nameplate and two glass brick columns at the sides, lighted from inside. The door will be a little to the west of center, permitting a larger display window.

**More Space Required**

Down the entire west side of the main dining room will be booths; the fountain and kitchen are on the east side. At the rear will be a new main floor dining room seating 110, in addition to the large dining room now situated in the basement. The restaurant will occupy more space than heretofore.

The interior will be entirely refurnished and refinished, new fixtures to include indirect lighting, it is announced by the proprietors, Frank Chatas and R. J. Nicol. This is the first remodeling of the Quelle since shortly after Mr. Chatas took charge, 4 1/2 years ago.

The state's answering brief in the appealed case of Al E. Rosser, under 12 years penitentiary sentence for arson, was filed in the state supreme court Saturday by Ralph E. Moody, legal adviser for the state police department.

Rosser, ex-head of the Oregon teamsters union, was convicted in the Polk county circuit court on July 10, 1938. He was charged with being implicated in the burning of the West Salem Box company with a loss of nearly \$100,000.
