Assessment Basis Told to Realtors

The basis upon which property appraisals for taxation purposes are made by the assessment and taxation staff of the state tax department, was explained at the Salem Realty board luncheon Friday noon by Arthur Selander, chief appraiser.

Taking business property as his example, Selander explained that reproduction cost less depreciation is taken as one factor and prudent investment based upon earnings as another; lot value is determined by a more involved process which reduces values in any locality to a front foot value. Salem's highest front foot value is around \$700, he mentioned.

These various bases are then appropriately weighted and the average taken as the appraisal, with assessment value then based upon the accepted ratio of assessed to actual value.
