Alleged Misgradings State Shipments Will Be Studied, Says

Governor Sprague Saturday addressed a letter to R. E. Cavett, secretary-treasurer of the Oregon Creamery Manufacturers association, in which he said he was deep ly concerned by reports that a minority group of the United States department of agriculture had arbitrarily reduced the rating and Honored Tonics grading of Oregon butter without

seeing the product. "I feel that the state is more or less the tail of the federal kite when it comes to grades and standards and agree with you that the place to make representations is with the federal department of agriculture," Governor Sprague

Cavett, in a letter to Governor Sprague, said the situation was so serious that it may turn back the growth of the Oregon butter industry a score of years or more. He added that at a recent hear-ing by the state agricultural de partment in Salem, one large cooperative creamery admitted a loss of \$2000 since the first of the

year on account of the new arbi trary grading system. Governor Sprague informed Cavett that he would go into the matter further, both to ascertain the nature and effect of grade changes and to determine the best course of action.






