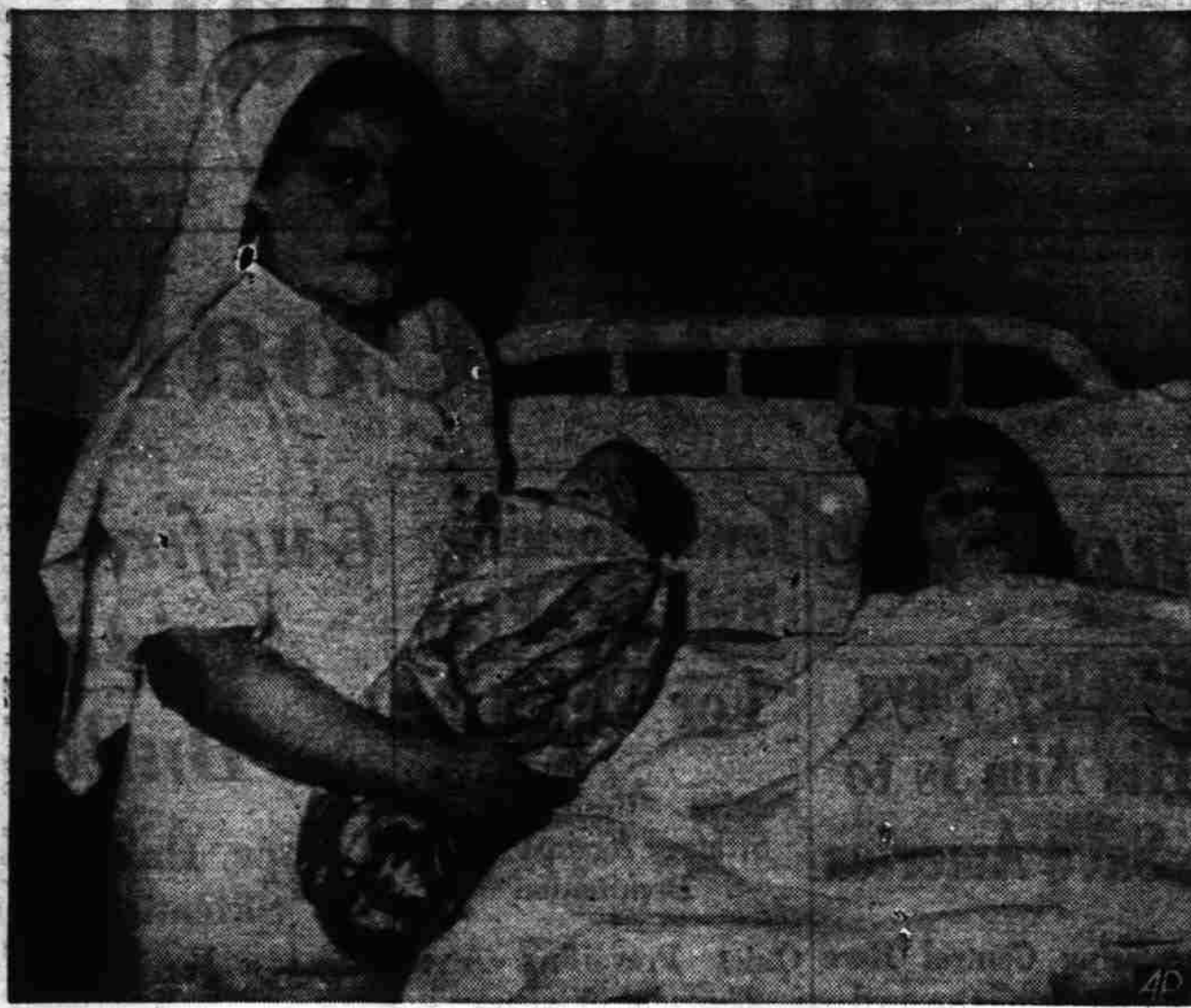

Dr. Hipolito Larrabure, chief surgeon of the hospital, termed it one of the strangest gynecological events ever known. He said the girl's age was corroborated by the fact she still had her first teeth and was three feet tall. \$500,000 Industry to

The Salem chamber of commerce yesterday swung into action to urge the Washington Veneer company of Olympia to give Salem thorough consideration before it selects a site for a half million dollar veneer plant in Oregon.

The action is in line with the chamber's recently inaugurated industrial promotion program and was taken by the industrial committee, of which Ray Yocom is chairman.

The Olympia company has had some contact with Springfield and other Oregon cities for the proposed plant. The Salem chamber offered cooperation in obtaining a site and establishing the plant if it comes here.

Other companies also said to be coming into the veneer field in Oregon will be contacted by the chamber's industrial committee. The Olympia concern has a plant also in Aberdeen.

Moseley Says Warning Given

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internationalism or Zionism and their increasing control in America, then he is attacked on all sides and even his life may be threatened.

"My work has been done frankly and in the open. If it is un-American to point out to our citizens today the tragic difficulties of the present situation in an effort to continue in existence the republic that millions of us still love, then I am guilty."

WASHINGTON, May 19.—(P)—The Dies committee on un-American activities issued four subpoenas today and called a public hearing for next Monday on what Chairman Dies (D-Tex) called an anti-semitic movement of "a most violent type."

One subpoena went to Major General George Van Horn Moseley, retired, whose name was linked with the movement. Dies said correspondence in the possession of the committee referred to Moseley as the "leader" and "the boss."

Another subpoena was issued for chairman John D. M. Hamilton of the republican national committee because, Dies said, the committee wanted to learn why Hamilton furnished a "mailing list" on request, to a man who was disseminating anti-semitic material.

Hamilton, in a public statement declared that he knew nothing of the man or of the anti-semitic campaign, that the republican national committee headquarters responded to a request for a list of "active members" because it always gives out the list to anyone who requests it.

Chinese Victory Held Enemy Blow

SHANGHAI, May 20.—(Saturday)—(P)—Shanghai returned to normal today with the completion of a 24-hour demonstration of strength by police and foreign defense forces.

Barbed wire barricades were withdrawn from downtown streets and foreign troops returned to their barracks after assisting the municipal police in "law and order" demonstration.

On the central China war fronts Chinese and Japanese issued conflicting claims of a major victory in northern Hupeh province.

Chinese reports said a large Chinese force had averted a Japanese attempt to encircle them and fell upon the invaders' leading wing in a surprise attack, killing at least 10,000.

The Chinese report claimed capture of Tienmen, central Hupeh town 75 miles west of Hankow and said Chinese troops were pursuing Japanese southward.

King George VI Visits Parliament

OTTAWA, May 19.—(P)—Canada dug out of discard today royal ritual dead nearly 100 years in order to see King George VI and Queen Elizabeth upon the thrones of Canada.

For the first time in history a British sovereign sat in the senate of the Canadian parliament as he sits in Westminster. In London he opens and prorogues parliament with state ceremonial, but here he gave only royal assent to bills passed through legislative processes.

Prior to the brilliant scene in the senate, King George had received the plaudits of Ottawa on a nine-mile drive through the city and suburbs.

The king also had shattered another precedent by receiving personally the credentials of the United States minister, Daniel C. Roper, exchanging with him felicitations and expressing friendship for President Roosevelt and the American people.

Germany Handed New Peace Offer

(By The Associated Press)
British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain Friday offered to confer with Germany with a view to reaching "a permanent peace" of Germany would renounce aggressive aims in such a way as to convince Britain that she meant it. The statement, made in the house of commons, was received coolly in Berlin, where official circles said it contributed little "of positive value" toward lessening European tension.

Chamberlain also said, in discussing the drawn out negotiations with Russia in which Britain seeks Moscow's support of the British-French bloc, that "there is a sort of veil or wall" between the London and Moscow governments.

Diplomats in Moscow stated that lingering suspicions regarding Chamberlain's ultimate motives in seeking Russian support remained one of the most obvious elements in the negotiations.

KLAMATH FALLS, May 19.—(P)—Jack Harrison and Dan Driscoll would like to know what is going to happen to them next.

The men are partners in stores at Beatty and Bly, eastern Klamath county. Wednesday night a safe containing \$261 was taken from the Bly store. At the same time, a garage and storeroom at the Beatty store were destroyed by fire, starting from an automobile.

Thursday an automobile killed a horse belonging to one of the partners. Another car skidded into the porch of the Beatty store, tearing out a pillar.

17 Are Quizzed On Murder Ring

PHILADELPHIA, May 19.—(P)—Seventeen men and women, including thrice-widowed Rose Carina, were given hearings or indicted on murder charges today as conductors of the mass murder-for-insurance case set the stage for early trials.

The prosecution already has obtained one first degree murder conviction of a man and murder indictments against two widows of poison victims and a tailor detective charge dealt in witchcraft and death.

Another defendant, a woman, halted her trial by pleading guilty to three poisonings.

Robert Bailey Memory Honored by Loan Fund

EUGENE, May 19.—(P)—A \$1000 short-time University of Oregon loan fund was planned today by the university's graduating class as a memorial to Robert Bailey, president of the class and son of an Oregon supreme court justice, who was drowned in the millrace on Easter Sunday.

Franco Reasserts Wish for Peace

MADRID, May 19.—(P)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco, speaking at the climax of a great civil war victory celebration tonight, declared "our desire is to collaborate in the pacification of Europe."

"Let us place our dignity and our independence above all," he said.

The generalissimo's speech was broadcast from a private studio in his Madrid residence.

"We shall not tolerate any attempt against our sovereignty because it would be useless," he said. "To try to lay siege against us from an economic viewpoint would amount to hampering our attempt to make a rapprochement with other countries."

Franco spoke after reviewing a mammoth military parade which was intended as a farewell to Italian, German and Moorish forces which helped the nationalists win the war.

Oregon Musician Is 96 Years Old

TILLAMOOK, May 19.—(P)—A tea will celebrate the 96th birthday Sunday of Mrs. Elizabeth Percy, music teacher who believes she is the world's oldest active musician.

Born in Manchester, England, Mrs. Percy was graduated from the Leipzig conservatory, Germany. In 1884 she appeared as Patti Sing in the premiere performance of Arthur Sullivan's opera Mikado, under the personal direction of the composer at the Savoy theatre, London. During her stage and operatic career she was known as Madame Alpenrose.

A son, Addi, now deceased, with whom she appeared before English nobility at garden parties before coming to the United States in 1885, was a Metropolitan opera star.
