

Lecturer Talks On Germany To AAUW

Mrs. Frances Virginia Melton was elected to head the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women at a meeting on Saturday afternoon at the Marion hotel. Vice president for next year will be Mrs. Elmer Berg; secretary will be Mrs. Dwight Lear; treasurer Mrs. Chester Luther and student loan fund chairman Miss Lorenza Jack. Willamette university graduates were presented during the meeting.

Dr. Erma Gordon, of Corvallis, who spent 5 1/2 years during the rise of Hitler, as a student in Germany, talked on the background of the present regime. Dr. Gordon received her Ph. D. from the University of Berlin.

Arriving in Germany four months before the election of Hitler by the aristocratic party in January, 1933, and by a vote of the people in March of that same year, Dr. Gordon witnessed this election, the burning of the Reichstag and the horrors of the bloody anti-Jewish riots which followed.

Hitler's rise to power, Dr. Gordon attributed to the sponsorship of the munitions interests whose factories were silent for so many years.

Speaking of education in Germany, Dr. Gordon said that its purpose in Germany is to produce political soldiers among both men and women. Women have no place in higher education and enrollment of the universities had dropped off almost half in the past few years.

From the age of ten, boys and girls are the wards of the government. The boys go to training camps and by the age of 14 are trained to walk as much as 18 miles a day, carrying 24 pounds.

He held various positions with the state highway commission starting in 1918, and working from district engineer to his present position. He has built a national reputation as a maintenance engineer and is probably better known over the United States than in Oregon. He has done outstanding work in oil road surfacing, and is called by other states for advice on technical problems, especially in the oil field.
