

Tourists Here May Set High

More Than \$40,000,000 May Be Spent Here; Advertising Draws

A high-pressure advertising campaign, which Oregonians don't hear much about, is likely to send Oregon's 1939 tourist trade to an all-time high of more than \$40,000,000.

This year the state travel and information department, of which Harold B. Say is director, will spend \$120,000 to lure people to Oregon. The department, which is under the state highway commission, showed several reasons for believing its campaign is bringing results.

Tourists spent about \$40,000,000 in 1937, and an equal amount in 1938. About \$10 a day is spent for each of the 3,000,000 cars that enter the state, the expenditure being for gas and oil, lodging and food.

Major industry here says that the tourist trade, which he says is a "gold mine," is rapidly becoming the state's major industry.

He has already received 55,000 requests for folders and information on Oregon's scenic and recreational attractions, and they are rolling in at the rate of 500 a day. Last year he received only 57,000 of these requests.

Crater Lake national park reported its tourist travel during the first half of May was 56 per cent more than during the same period last year. Gasoline taxes, always a good travel inducer, during the first three months of the year were up \$167,000 over last year.

Non-resident motor vehicle registrations for April were 7,596, about 500 more than in April, 1938.

The San Francisco fair already has paid \$100,000 in advertising, because many eastern Washington tourists have been spending money in the state on their way south.

Nation's Readers See as The department cooperates with the Washington state progress commission in its advertising. Washington's advertising theme is "America at her Best," while Oregon's is "Air-Conditioned Oregon."

Oregon spends \$65,000 this year in magazine advertising and \$18,000 in newspaper advertising.

About 500,000 booklets and maps also will be distributed over the country.

Besides all this advertising, Oregon gets a lot of free publicity. Newspapers travel section editors frequently ask for pictures and word descriptions of Oregon's scenic spots.

Every month say compiles reports of non-resident registrations, showing how many cars come from each state. Then he sends the reports to the leading newspapers in the states.

For instance, if 34 cars from Michigan were registered, say sends a story to a Detroit paper to the effect that 34 Michigan families took advantage of Oregon's scenic and recreational values. Then he tells what a tourist can do in Oregon. If you don't believe this works, just take a look at Say's scrapbook.

time, which was unquestionably an Arabian country. But on this subject one certainly can't say whether the British have any right in Palestine—which is certainly not an English country—or whether they have any right in Iraq; or whether they had any right to take, as they did a short time ago, a large chunk of Saudi-Arabia and make it into a protectorate. But there is no suggestion in the White Paper that the British should get out, or in any way limit their activities, or relinquish any of their ownership!

The British are in Palestine by right of the "conquest of arms."

The Jews are in Palestine by agreement with the British and by right of colonization and development.

Palestine has become a problem by reason of the incitation of the Arab population by rabid nationalist, operating with terrorist gangs and assisted by Italian and German propaganda, and Britain has decided that the safest thing for her to do is to come to terms with the Arab leaders.

As a matter of fact, the policy embodied in the White Paper was made neither in Jerusalem nor in London, but in Cairo, where the Egyptian government, out of distress over Mussolini's activities there, is begging for "peace at any price."

But this column gravely fears that the policy now adopted will neither lead to peace nor add anything to the prestige of Great Britain.

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Mayor Sets Aside Salem Poppy Day

Chadwick Urges All City to Help by Buying Poppies May 26

In a proclamation issued by Mayor W. W. Chadwick, Friday, May 19, he designated Poppy Day in Salem. The proclamation asked all citizens to observe the day by wearing a memorial poppy in honor of those who gave their lives in the World War, and to contribute to the welfare of the disabled veterans and dependent families of veterans. It stated:

"Whereas, when the forces of ruthless autocracy committed aggressions against the United States in 1917, the best young men of this nation offered their lives in the nation's defense, and

"Whereas, among these our men were many from Salem, who served gallantly and sacrificed greatly in the conflict, and

"Whereas, more than one hundred thousand American soldiers were called upon to sacrifice their lives that America might be secure as the land of liberty, justice and democracy,

"Now, therefore, I, W. W. Chadwick, mayor of the City of Salem, believing that the memory of their high patriotic sacrifice should be kept bright for the inspiration of America, urge all citizens to wear their memorial flower, the poppy, on Friday, May 26, and give for the poppy as generously as they are able to aid the war's living victims, the disabled veterans and dependent families.

"To that purpose, I do hereby proclaim Friday, May 26, to be Poppy Day in the City of Salem."

Summer Swim Caution Urged

First Aid Officers Issue Advice, Hope to Avert Casualties Thereby

(Editor's Note: The following are the yearly words of caution, issued by officers of the city first aid commission, which they hope will save a life or lives from drowning during the summer swimming season.)

As the weather gets warmer, and the end of the school term draws near, we realize that once again the swimming season is here and words of caution are timely.

Each year unnecessary drownings occur right here in this community, when there is no reason why anyone should lose his life by drowning in or near Salem.

Every child, and older who finds his swimming stroke becoming rusty, should avail themselves of the splendid opportunity to acquire swimming perfection in the supervised pools, where competent instructors are on duty. It is enjoyable recreation, as well as being a means of forestalling a drowning.

Don't Eat, Then Swim
A top "don't" on the swimming list forbids the dangerous practice of diving into a pool immediately after consuming a hearty meal.

Don't enter the water sooner than two hours after eating. It is dangerous to swim alone, or to dive into unknown waters, that may not be as deep as they appear. Serious injury, possibly a fatal one, may result.

Keep in mind, if you are in the water during an electric storm, that there is danger of electrocution; don't rock a boat just because you feel like it, for while you may be able to swim the 200-yard companion way now, you may not be so lucky if you are in the water during a storm.

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How Does Your Garden Grow?

Lack of rain won't keep the W. S. Jack holly bush from being as loaded with berries as usual. While I was visiting around in the Jack gardens this week I noticed how very full of berries the shrub was.

"Water," said Mr. Jack, "I've been watering that shrub practically all the time since the first of the year. We haven't been getting enough rain to do the holly much good this spring. I take the sprinkler off the hose and let it run for half an hour each day beneath the shrub."

They are practically gone now, but Mr. Jack has had some interesting Indian Moccasins in his wild flower corner. He got these from eastern Oregon, but he recalls that 30 or 40 years ago they were plentiful in the Silverton area. He has them growing in the shade and plenty of leaf mold surrounds them.

An interesting point in Mr. Jack's garden is his rockery on the banks of Silver Creek. The rockery is a replica of a spot Mr. and Mrs. Jack admired some years ago on the Santiam.

Mr. Jack, another of Silverton's snake fanciers, has 16 adult harmless and helpful garden snakes besides a few young ones. They keep the earwigs and slugs cleaned up, he believes.

Things to do this week: Spray or dust your roses. Set out the rosebuds well cultivated to conserve moisture.

Cut off all dead blooms. Don't throw them on the ground. They look unsightly and they may scatter disease. Picking them into a paper bag and burning the bag is a good idea.

Set out some dahlias and gladioli.

Scatter a little complete fertilizer beneath the rose bushes, rake it lightly in, water well and cultivate again in a day or so.

Remember the potatoes give your stems more strength. Too much nitrogen in the rose garden tends to give lanky growth.

Cow manure is the best fertilizer in the rose bed.

Feed Shade Trees
Shade trees must be fed if they are to have a root system and thick, healthy foliage. Give them a heavy feeding of a balanced fertilizer. Don't place the food right at the trunk of the tree. Feeder roots are out farther, more to the end of the branches.

The tree roses out on the Wallace road gardens are now at their best. Tree roses have gained rapidly in popularity in recent years. I notice that a number of lovely ones are now for several months. The wooden labels should be soaked thoroughly in sulphate of iron, and when they dry place them in lime water.

W. C. A.—Blueberries and huckleberries are not the same although the cultural directions are the same. Blueberries belong to the genus Vaccinium.

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and have tiny seeds, the huckleberry is a gaulthiaca and has coarser buds.

A. A. P.—Foxgloves are biennials and when they have bloomed had best be removed unless you particularly want to save them for seed.

Mosaic on Tulips
R. W.—I should say that your tulips were affected by mosaic. Dig and destroy all the diseased plants at once. The bulbs whose leaves and flowers were all right should be planted in a bed where tulips have not grown before.

M. H. C.—From your description I would say that your rambler mildew roses this season. Dig around the bush, give it a thorough application of balanced fertilizer and water well down. If there is any dead wood, cut it out and burn. As soon as the bush has bloomed cut off all old stalks and leave but three or four of the new healthy canes.

V. L. M.—Prune your lilacs now. Cut off all dead flowers, trim out weak shoots. Bonemeal is most often advised for delphiniums. Work it into the soil a few inches from the crown of the plants. If the delphiniums are growing in the shade better water them in the morning. To control the mildew, dust the plants with some sulphur preparation. Your hollyhocks are undoubtedly suffering from rust. Use a Bordeaux mixture spray on the plants. See that it reaches every part of them and the soil beneath them as well. Pick off and burn all affected leaves.

P. F. M.—Spittle bug is likely affecting your chrysanthemums. If a control isn't used, the pest can cripple the plants badly. Use a rotenone dust on them. If the mums start to go tall and spindly, pinch them back. Give the plants a balanced fertilizer. Your care of the mums from now until blooming season will certainly show. Don't cut your peony foliage for a few weeks yet. Give the plants an opportunity to mature. When you do cut them, burn the foliage. Bonemeal is said to be the safest fertilizer to use on peonies.

F. O. W.—Copper sulphate dissolved in ordinary ink is said to hold the writing on zinc for several months. The wooden labels should be soaked thoroughly in sulphate of iron, and when they dry place them in lime water.

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
