This year a sweepstakes show to which only the first prize winners in each of the county shows is eligible to compete is an added attraction and is adding a great deal of interest.

A state Jersey herd is to be selected to compete at the National Dairy show at the San Francisco world's fair this fall and winners in the spring show series will be candidates for the state herd to be selected by a committee already appointed.

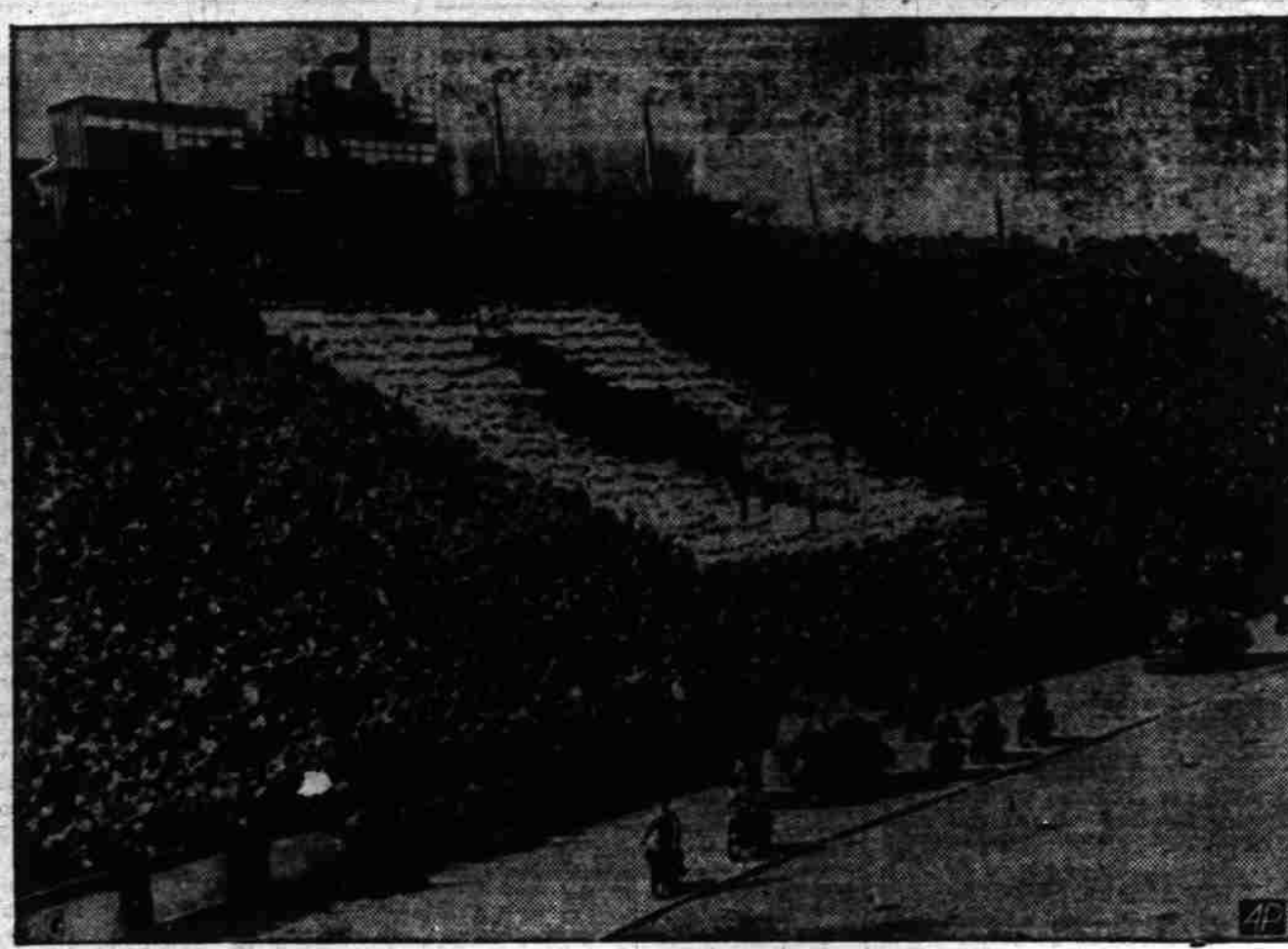
The dates for the various county shows as announced by W. C. Leth, secretary of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club are as follows:

Eitelgeorge Trial Reopens at Dallas

Jury Selected, Testimony Begun; Case Involves Statutory Charge

DALLAS—The second trial of Lewis Otto Eitelgeorge, Salem mechanic, on a statutory charge got under way here Monday before Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker.

E. O. Emmons of Salem and Oscar Hayer of Dallas are defense attorneys while Bruce Spaulding, district attorney, is prosecutor. The jury was selected by noon and included: Mrs. Jack Eakin, Otto Adolf, William E. Knower, O. G. Willis, William Colgrove, Tom Syron, Glen W. Davis, Corrine Riney, Roy J. Alderson, Addie Mae Fetters, J. W. McCormick, and A. G. Thary.

Monday afternoon was mostly given over to the testimony of Juanita Bass, who told of the trip taken by herself and Alice Atchison in Eitelgeorge's car. Five other witnesses were called.

Eitelgeorge was indicted on six counts by the Polk county grand jury here several weeks ago, three of them involving Alice Atchison of West Salem and three involving Juanita Bass of Mehama. The present trial is on the grand jury indictment charging contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and involves Juanita Bass.

Eitelgeorge was tried here previously about a month ago on a charge of assault with intent to rape which involved Alice Atchison. The jury was dismissed by Judge Walker after it had deliberated over 25 hours and was unable to reach a verdict.
