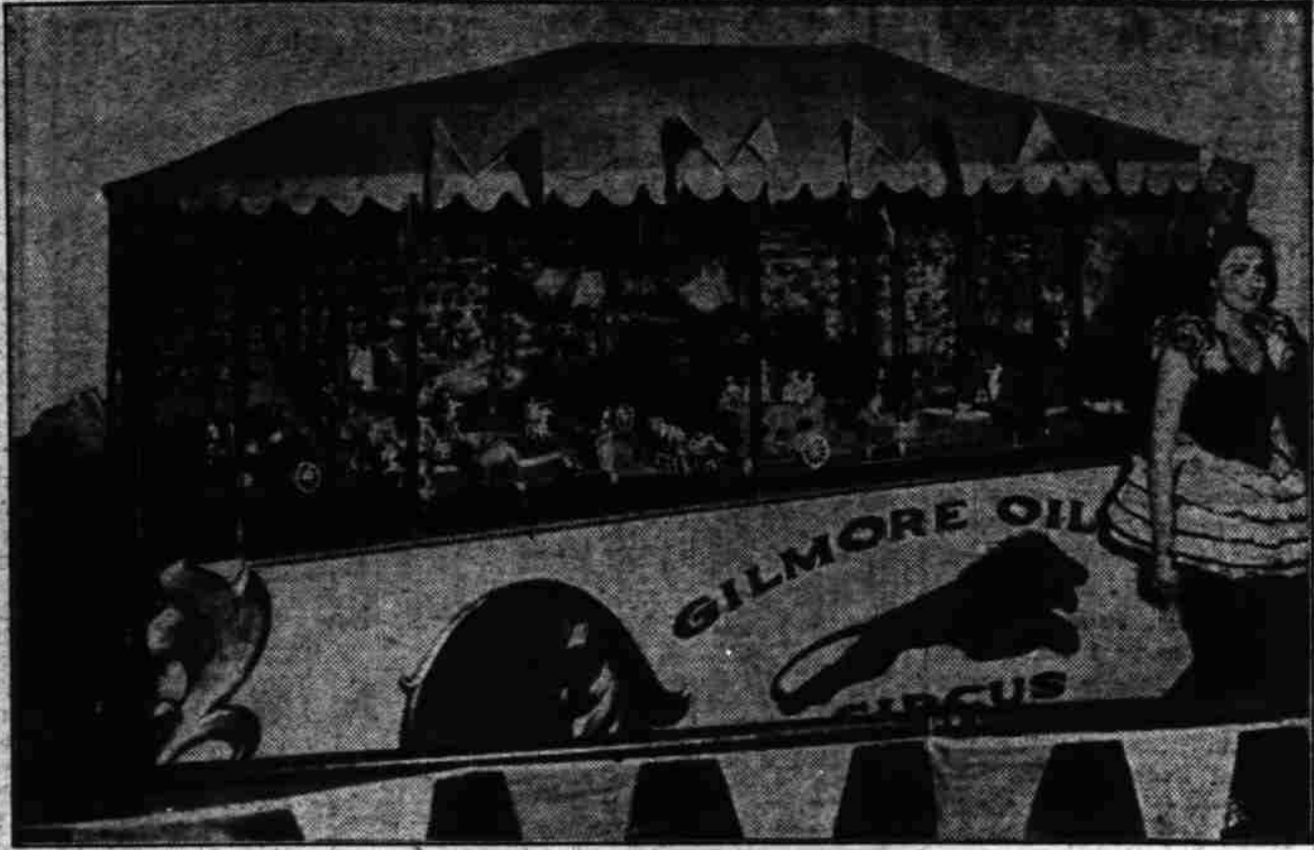

The tabby mother and month old fox, pictured above, are on the Dr. George C. Knott farm four miles north of town on the Greenwood road. The fox has grown twice as fast as the baby kittens and is fully as large as the mother cat. Below, no more drought worries for Robert Bliff, who has irrigation for 15 acres of sudan grass and stock beets on his farm three miles south of town. The pump throws 150 to 200 gallons per minute, and the sprinklers, installed every 60 feet, are moved every 2 1/2 hours while in use.
