Convention Banquet Draws 400 Persons; 3-Day Meet Ends

Peter Zimmerman was elected delegate to the national convention in November, 1939. All elections and re-elections were unanimous.

Nearly 400 members and friends of the Farmers' Union attended the annual banquet held Wednesday night in the physical education building, Oregon College of Education, Floyd Center, Dallas, was master of ceremonies, introducing several distinguished members and guests.

Announcement was made by Ronald Jones of Brooks that all annual junior dinner and banquet are postponed until June 2.

Peter Zimmerman spoke briefly on the economic problems inhibiting farm progress, and the need to lift produce prices to all levels commensurate with other forms of industry.

J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture, said he had nothing to add or take from his statements of Tuesday: That the merchant, farmer, business man and manufacturer will all be more prosperous when, and if the farmer can receive the pay given to labor.

**Heads Farmers**

Harley Libby of Marion, yesterday elected president of the Oregon Farmers' union, succeeding G. W. Potts of Jefferson, retiring after six years in this office.

Sochrist, Ballston, also spoke briefly.

Sprague Speaks Governor Charles A. Sprague, congratulating the union on its growth, and on the activity and energy which mark its enterprises, said:

"Agriculture is our state's principal industry. There are 25,000 families dependent on farm activities. We must continue to develop agriculture if we intend to maintain the welfare of our state. Opportunity along the lines of industry and agriculture go hand in hand. We need balance between them to foster a better life for all our people."

"The farm problem has baffled leaders for many years. I recognize that the solutions are not simple solutions. I know farmers must operate on a commercial basis so they are on a parallel with other industries. From a sociological angle farm people form the basis of our commonwealth. We don't want our farm people to become peasantry."

"The drought this year is serious, particularly to range and stock raisers. We can't continue indefinitely to 'mine' our soil."

"Human erosion on farms is another contributing factor to the farm problem. So many people have left the farms to seek fortune in the cities. A wholesome, active rural life is needed to prevent such human erosion from the farms."

Discusses Power The governor discussed recent legislation on the power bill, commending Peter Zimmerman and other committee members for their diligent unyielding integrity which refused agreement to any sale of revenue or obligation bonds at private sale, and their insistence that they be sold to the highest bidder.

"We are interested in getting abundant power for industrial development, available to farmers. Irrigation is a coming need. Electric energy is needed at low prices to operate pumps for irrigation facilities. I want to see electricity delivered to the consumers at the lowest possible prices."

H. G. Keeney, Omaha, Neb., vice-president of the national Farmers' Union, said he believed the Oregonians have a good government; a good governor, and are passing laws for good in the future. He said the farm problem is an economic problem. The farmer cannot pass taxes on to other groups.

"In my opinion," he said, "it is useless to bring all modern conveniences to the farm without finding a way to pay for them. I would rather have the old kerosene lamps than be uncertain about being closed out on the farm."

Recall First Nilsen Concert SILVERTON—The appearance of Sigurd Nilsen, noted singer, in concert at Portland and at Silverton during the past week, recalled to the minds of Silverton people Mr. Nilsen's first appearance at Silverton, four years before his debut in Europe.

Mr. Nilsen sang at the two-day celebration held July 4 and 5 in 1919 for Silverton's returned soldiers. The city was host at the two-day affair and Mrs. R. A. Gourlie, who now lives on Fisk street, was general chairman of affairs. Mrs. Gourlie still wears the cameo ring presented to her by the city for her work. Mrs. Helen Wrightman was Mrs. Nilsen's accompanist at the concert. Mrs. Wrightman was pleasantly surprised that Mr. Nilsen recalled the programs.
