Statesman Show Recipes

At yesterday's Statesman cooking show Miss Barbara Miller, cooking expert, prepared the following recipes:

NET BREAD
3 cups Fisher's flour; 5 tsp. baking powder; 1 1/2 tsp. salt; 1/2 cup White Satin sugar; 1 egg; 1 1/2 cups milk; 1/2 cup melted Crisco; 1 cup chopped walnut meats.
Sift dry ingredients and add nut meats. Beat egg, add milk and Crisco. Add to dry ingredients and mix well. Turn into greased bread pan and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

PINEAPPLE FRITTERS
1 1/2 cups Fisher's flour; 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder; 1/2 tsp. salt; 1 tsp. White Satin sugar; 1 egg; 1/2 cup milk; sliced pineapple; Crisco.
Sift dry ingredients. Beat egg and add milk and beat into dry ingredients. Heat Crisco to 375 degrees. Dip pineapple into batter and fry in Crisco. Drain on soft crumpled paper and sprinkle with White Satin sugar.

ORANGE MARMALADE
4 med. sized thin skin oranges; 1 lemon; 3 cups water; 1/2 tsp. soda; 1 package Pen-Jel; 5 cups White Satin sugar; 1/2 doz. Kerr-Mason glasses.
Slice very thin the orange and lemon peel. Add water and soda and simmer for a few minutes until moderately soft. Add fruit cut into small pieces and boil until added water is removed, which should leave about 5 cups. Stir in 1 package Pen-Jel and bring to a brisk boil. Add 5 cups of sugar and boil to 222 degrees or until spoonful thickens on cold plate. Pour into Kerr-Mason glasses and paraffine.

CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM
1 tsp. plain gelatine; 2 tsp. cold water; 1 cup milk; 1/2 cup White Satin sugar; 1/2 cup Guitard chocolate; 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla; 1 cup cream.
Soak gelatine in cold water. Mix sugar and chocolate. Scald milk and add soaked gelatine and sugar mixture. Stir until dissolved. Pour into tray of electric refrigerator and freeze. Remove from tray, chop fine and whip. Whip cream and fold the two mixtures together. Add vanilla and return to refrigerator tray and freeze without stirring.

OVEN DINNER
Baked Salmon with Sour Cream and Escalloped Tomatoes
3 or 4 pound salmon; 1 cup sour cream; 2 tsp. grated onion; salt and pepper; juice of one lemon; Tabasco Sauce; Paprika.
Wipe fish with damp cloth and place in baking dish. Skin side down. Mix onion, lemon juice and dash Tabasco sauce. Spread on fish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Carefully pour over sour cream and bake at 400 degrees for 45 min. Garnish with water cress.

ESCALLOPED TOMATOES
3 cups tomatoes; 1/2 green pepper; 2 tsp. grated onion; 1 tsp. salt; 1/4 tsp. pepper; 1 tsp. sugar; 3 tsp. butter; 1 cup bread crumbs; 1 cup Blue Bell Chd crumbs; dash Tabasco Sauce.
Add chopped green pepper, salt, pepper, sugar, grated onion, Tabasco to tomatoes. Put a layer of mixed potato chips and bread crumbs in bottom of a greased baking dish. Add half of the tomatoes. Some bits of butter, more crumbs and then the remaining tomatoes. Sprinkle top with crumbs and dot with butter. Bake at 400 degrees about 30 min.

FLAKY PASTRY
3 cups Fisher's flour; 1 1/2 tsp. salt; 1 cup Crisco; ice water; 1/2 tsp. baking powder.
Sift flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in Crisco with pastry blender, leaving Crisco in pieces as large as green peas. Add ice water gradually using just enough to hold dough together. Wrap in wax paper and store in electric refrigerator.

APPLE AND PEAR PIE
6 or 8 apples; 4 pears (fresh or canned); cinnamon and nutmeg; 1/2 cup White Satin sugar; 1 tsp. Fisher flour.
Line pie plate with pastry. Arrange a layer of apples, sprinkle with sugar, flour and spices that have been well mixed. Add layer of pears and then layer of apples. Dot with butter and sprinkle with remaining sugar. Cover with pastry and bake in hot oven (450) for 10 min. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 35 min.

CHOCOLATE PIE
1/2 cup White Satin sugar; 7 tsp. Fisher flour; 1/2 tsp. salt; 2 egg yolks; 2 cups milk; 1 tsp. vanilla; 1/2 cup Guitard Chocolate.
Mix sugar, salt, chocolate and flour. Add beaten egg yolks. Scald milk and combine the two mixtures. Cook over low heat until thick, stirring constantly. Cook and add vanilla. Pour into baked pastry shell and top with meringue, made by heating egg whites until stiff and fold in 1/4 cup sugar. Bake in slow oven 325 degrees for 15 min.

Corvallis Pastor Will Give Main Address Tuesday at Armory
ALBANY—Memorial day will be celebrated with fitting ceremonies by the patriotic organizations of the city. W. W. Sturt, sr., will act as marshal of the day and will lead the parade which will start from the armory at 10 o'clock. The Albany high school band, the junior drum corps and Battery A, coast artillery, will march in uniform.
The program will take place at the Veterans' memorial hall, with Rev. C. E. Coles giving the invocation; Delbert Weigal, "Logan's General Order;" Richard Wick, "Lincoln's Gettysburg Address;" music by the band, and the address by Rev. Daniel Stevens, pastor of the First Methodist church, Corvallis.
Decorating of the symbolic grave will be made by the Ladies of the GAR; the auxiliaries of the United Spanish War Veterans, the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Daughters of Union Veterans, the War Mothers and Public Schools.
The program will close with "Laps" and benediction by Dr. Coles.

Coming to Albany to take over the management of the Penney store is M. E. Ridd who has been manager of the Milton-Freewater store.



In News Again

Joseph C. Grew U. S. Ambassador to Japan Joseph C. Grew is projected into the news again as the United States refuses to grant Japan's demand for increased Japanese representation in the International Settlement at Shanghai, China. On instructions from the state department, Grew delivered a memorandum to this effect at the Japanese foreign office in Tokio. At the same time, American naval forces were landing at another international settlement at Amoy to defend American interests against Japanese troops which occupied the treaty area. British and French patrols followed the American landing party.
