Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Carefully pour over sour cream and bake at 400 degrees for 45 min. Garnish with water cress.

ESCALLOPED TOMATOES 3 cups tomatoes; 1/2 green pepper; 2 tsp. grated onion; 1 tsp. salt; 4 tsp. pepper; 1 tsp. sugar; 3 tbsp. butter; 1 cup bread crumbs; 1 cup Blue Bell Chip crumbs; dash Tabasco Sauce.

Add chopped green pepper, salt, pepper, sugar, grated onion, Tabasco to tomatoes. Put a layer of mixed potato chips and bread crumbs in bottom of a greased baking dish. APPLE AND PEAR PJE 6 or 8 apples; 4 pears (fresh or canned); cinnamon and nutmeg;




