Sick Husband Is Carried From House; Child Saves Bicycle

ALBANY, May 27,-(A)-A mother's heroic rescue work saved her family and another woman and her sick husband from death in a fire at 3 a. m. today which destroyed their apartment build-

Her throat choked by smeke, Mrs. Kenneth Kelly hurried from her bed, aroused her husband and a son, Dickie, 8, in an adjoining room, and with a daughter, Sharon eight months old, in her arms and Dickle at her heels, she got them outdoors to safety.

Remembering their tenants, Mr and Mrs. Bert Nesbitt, Mrs. Kelly ran back into the flaming house and helped Mrs. Nesbitt carry Nesbitt, who was sick, to the street. Meantime, Kelly, half dressed, drove to a fire station to spread an alarm but the house was destroyed with most of its contents. The loss was estimated

Fighting through the smoke filled halls, Mrs. Kelly recalled that she once tried to turn on a hall light because it was so dark only to find that the light already

"Yes, by all means, the parking meters should be installed. Whether right or wrong, they should be tried. For every disgruntled farmer who refuses to buy in Salem due to meters, you will find 10 to take his place."

"I spent considerable time in a California city last summer. They had meters in their busy business section. I always found a parking space in the location suitable to my shopping needs. I wished daily that Salem would soon have the

"Why turn down something that will pay for itself, be a money maker for the city and do a lot to improve traffic difficulties and congestion downtown. There was opposition to our traffic signals for years before they were installed, but how many want to take them out now? Personally I would like to see a few more in

Negative Argument "I fail to see how the installation of parking meters will increase the number of parking spaces available. It will only take the parking privilege from those unwilling to pay the 5c fee and save it for those with more nickels in their pockets. Personally I will walk or buy elsewhere before I will pay such an unjust and unnecessary tax."

"Our parking situation could be improved many times in my personal estimation if the streets were re-marked back to the 45degree angle used in the past. Then take the busses off the streets entirely and put them in a central bus terminal . . . 
