High School at Mt. Angel Will Hold Separate Graduation

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Tribute Paid Honored Dead

Father Alcui Also Urges Vigilance to Keep Freedom Here

MT. ANGEL—Memorial day was observed in Mt. Angel with the celebration of mass on an outdoor altar in the center of Mt. Calvary cemetery. An immense crowd, many of them visitors, attended the beautiful and impressive ceremony. St. Mary's choir sang during the mass.

Rev. Father Alcui, assisted by Rev. John Cuminsky, officiated. In his address to the crowd, Father Alcui paid homage to the fallen heroes but exhorted the living to a constant vigilance that "the freedom of which we sing may not be surrendered to the isms that infect our land."

He named abidance by the Constitution and the inculcating of the principles of true American citizenship in the minds and hearts of the people, especially the youth of the land, as the strongest weapons in the fight to keep the country the haven of freedom the makers of the Constitution intended it to be.

The American Legion and the Legion auxiliary with their color guards and buglers escorted the priests and servers from the entrance gates to the altar and marched with Father Alcui, when after the mass he visited each veteran's grave, first on Mt. Calvary and later on the nearby, old St. Mary's cemetery.

As the services ended, the sweet, sad notes of taps sounded over the peaceful scene.
