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Gas Sale Suit Hearing Opens

Shell Company Defendant in \$3000 Damage Case Before Court

The circuit court jury yesterday began hearing a dispute over the retail price of gasoline which resulted in a \$3000 damage suit by George A. and Thelma M. Raymond against the Shell Oil company of California. The trial will continue at 9 o'clock this morning. The Raymonds assert the oil company breached its contract to sell them gasoline at wholesale and induced the Salem Tillamook Oil company similarly to breach its contract. The Shell company, on March 15, 1938, refused to deliver further gasoline to Raymonds' garage unless he would cease his practice of more than a year past of selling motor fuel to cash retail customers at wholesale price plus two cents, the complaint avers.

In answer the Shell company pleaded it was only acting under terms of the fair trade act.

Government Hand In Trade Rapped

Hawley Says People Are Not Keeping Plant Going now

People of the United States as a whole today are "not only living from hand to mouth but are not keeping the old plant going" because governmental interference with and control of business has discouraged capital and with few exceptions by its policies severely curtailed production of durable goods, Willis C. Hawley, representative from the first Oregon district through the 60th to 72nd congresses, declared before the Salem Rotary club yesterday.

Cartellism Needed
The American people yet are great and if given a chance by changed national government can restore prosperity, Hawley maintained. Economy in governmental expenditure, restoration of public confidence by stable policy and removal of present interference from Washington were urged by Hawley as solutions to present business troubles. The congress itself should restore confidence by its unlimited power of taxation and stabilize its tax policies, he added.

The people need a national executive who can be looked to, he declared, or republican, to exercise his veto power courageously against appropriations that are not for the good of the nation as a whole, Hawley concluded.

The governor's telegram said: "I invite you to stop in Oregon on your forthcoming visit to the Pacific coast, and particularly to stop in Salem and inspect the new state capitol which was erected with federal assistance and in whose building to replace the old capitol that burned you took personal interest."

Reunion Cause

Aurelius S. Finch Finds Papa Finch Through Family Name

Charley Finch of the Pacific Studio of Music 1 firmly convinced there's something in a name—at least the peculiar name of Aurelius S. Finch through it he became reunited a few days ago with his son, whom he last saw in 1908 when the son, Aurelius S. Finch, was a lad of seven.

"It's a long story, so you might just as well come in and sit down to hear it," Finch told a Statesman reporter who called yesterday at his home at 1533 Court street.

He related that the strangest part of it all is that father and son have lived in Salem since June 18, 1938, without knowing of each other's identity.

For Nothing
"I'll have to begin by saying my marriage went on the rocks in 1908. That was in Portland. The mother took Aurelius S., our seven-year-old son. The 'S' is just that, it doesn't stand for anything. It is my own name, too, though it embarrassed me when I was a youngster because my friends kidded me so much about it, so I dropped it and became plain Charley. That name Aurelius S. has been passed down in our family for generations."

"Well, I remarried in 1910 and two more sons came. One I named Ernest Aurelius S. Finch, the other Ray C. Finch. Ray had a baby boy not long ago whom he named Ray Aurelius S. I have to mention these because they are all part of the reunion story."

"Well, the last trace I had of the oldest boy was in 1914 for his mother took him to Kansas after the divorce. He went to war, and in 1918 I met a man who said the boy had been killed in France. So of course I gave up looking for him. But the son never stopped looking for me. From Portland I went to Texas, and about six years ago came here."

"After my first son, Aurelius S., and I were reunited, I learned how it came about. You see, he has always gone by the initials A. S., and a friend of his wife kept leading me to know for what these initials stood."

"Finally he broke down and told her. She said, well, that was a strange name, but she had read it in a Salem paper, in connection with the christening of a baby. On more thought, she decided the baby's last name was Finch. Well, my first son Aurelius knew he was on the track of a relative. The baby was Ray's son, of course."

"And to shorten the story, one day a big tall man came to Charley Finch's door. Of course the father didn't know the son—but son knew father, for father's hair has been almost as white as it is now since he was 21 years old. And the music sign at the house was another connecting link."

So in the last two weeks father Aurelius S. or Charley and son Aurelius S. have been reunited, spanning the gap between 1908. Son A. S. is, by the way, the White sewing machine man with Miller's store and lives at 1964 Hazel.

Capital Unit to Award Outstanding Member at Summer Camp

The interest of the American Legion auxiliary will follow the 40,000 young men who will attend the citizens military training camps this summer, said Mrs. Leon Brown, chairman of the national defense committee of Capital unit of the auxiliary here. Many of these young men will be sons of auxiliary members and many others will have their attention directed toward the camps by the efforts of the auxiliary. Capital unit will give a \$5 award to the outstanding second year Salem boy at camp which is at Vancouver, Wash., from July 1 to July 30.

The camps are open to young men from 17 to 24 years of age for the basic course, and up to 29 for the most advanced course, much time being given to athletics, health training and citizenship instruction, the purpose of the camps being to better equip the trainees for useful citizenship in peace as well as to perform their citizenship duties in time of war.
