Grand champion honors for both bull and cow went to Rex Ross of Mt. Angel, president of the state Jersey cattle club, in the Marion county spring Jersey jubilee, held yesterday on the fairgrounds. Ross also took both senior and junior championship on bulls and senior champion cow and first on junior and senior set of sire and produce of dam. Eighty-eight cows were entered.

In the 4H division, Howard Sauer, 11, of Keiser, won the trophy for champion cow under one year and Emma Louis Pfennig, Bethel, the trophy for champion cow over one year. Both trophies are awarded by the Marion county Jersey cattle club, sponsor of the spring show, and have been held the past year by Alice Roberts of Turner. In 4H showmanship, Henry Pfennig, Bethel, was first and Delbert King, second.
