Selling was encouraged by weather and belief expressed in some quarters that recent improved wheat conditions may be reflected to a greater .tent in the official government crop report to be issued next Friday. On the other hand, buying, credited partly to willing interests, was based to some extent on the supporting effect of government loan rates, which are above future quotations in most markets.


