Teachers Scatter For Summer Days

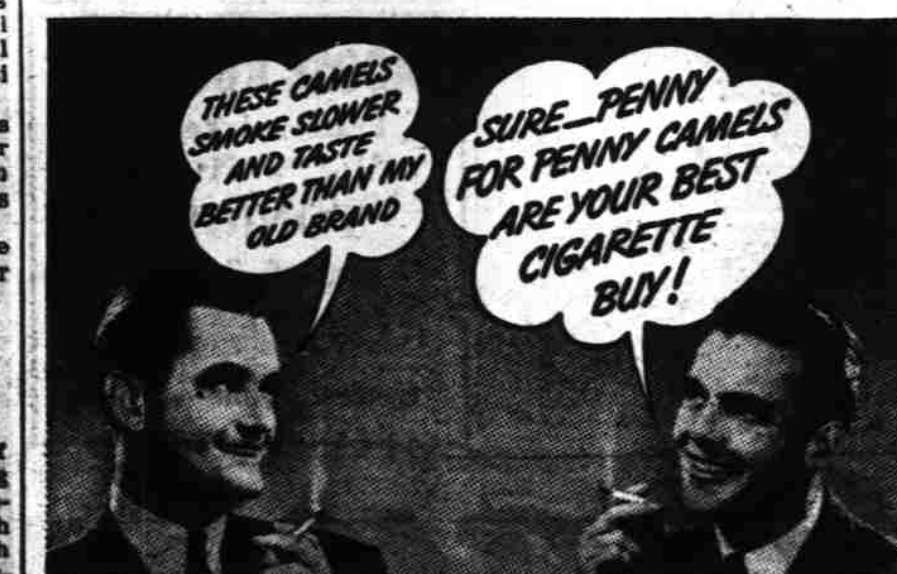

Materialism Is Warned Against

Rev. Carey of St. Martin's
Gives Address to 42
Mt. Angel Grads

MT. ANGEL—Assuring the 42 graduates of Mt. Angel college that they would "get out of life exactly what you put into it," Rev. Vincent Carey, dean of men at St. Martin's college, Lacey, Wash., gave a stirring address at the 52nd commencement exercises of the school. He urged them to disregard the gospel of the world which measures success by material gain, saying there was often a great difference between success and happiness.

"We do not hesitate to send you out into the world because we know you will have an influence for good on the world," Abbot Thomas, president of the college, said among other things in a brief speech following the conferring of honors.

The medal for oratory, which the judges decision had given to Ivo Bauman of Mt. Angel, was awarded to Anthony Broxmeyer of Tillamook, runner-up in the contest, since Bauman preferred to accept the general excellence medal for which he was also named first place winner. The two gold medals were donated respectively by Ambrose Gherini, San Francisco attorney, and Dr. Ed Lebold of Salem, both alumni of Mt. Angel college.
