

Rev. Gregory Robl, OSB, Heads Alumni of Mt. Angel College

100 Graduates Attend Banquet

Tom Windishar, Salem, Is Second Vice-President for New Year

MT. ANGEL — Rev. Gregory Robl, OSB, pastor of Sacred Heart church in Portland and only living member of the first group of five seminarians that entered the newly opened seminary in Mt. Angel in 1889, was chosen as president of the Mt. Angel college alumni association at the annual banquet at the college Monday night. The retiring president is Rev. Louis Sander of Portland.

Re-elected as first vice-president is Thomas Shea, editor of the "Telegram" of Portland. Thomas Windishar, president of the Salem chamber of commerce, was selected as second vice-president, and Frederick J. Kohlman, professor of biology at Portland university, third vice-president. John Cook, Marshfield, was elected sergeant-at-arms, Rev. Francis Leipsig, Eugene, and Rev. James Kossler, Mt. Angel, re-elected secretary-treasurer and historian, respectively.

The banquet was attended by about 100 old students. From Alaska came Rev. Timothy Ryan of Cordova and Rev. Edgar Gallant of Skagway. Rev. David Melbourne of St. Paul, Minn., who was ordained at Seattle last Saturday was present, and so, also, was Harley Baker, the only student of Our Lady of the Lake seminary in Cleveland, Ohio. Hubert Peters came from Santa Rosa, Calif. Others came from all parts of Oregon and from Washington.

Father Alcibiades presided as toastmaster at the banquet. The welcome was given by Rev. Eugene Medved, rector of the college. Father Gregory spoke on the golden jubilee of the seminary and Rev. Leipsig told of the ideals of good old Abbot Adelhelm who founded the college and seminary. Senator Francisovich, listed to speak on "Alumnus Looks at the State," could not be present but Alexander Scharbach discussed the effects of materialistic philosophy on modern literature.

Marcel Van Driesche, who was married in the college chapel Monday morning, Tom Shea, and Rev. Gallant gave impromptu speeches, and Abbot Thomas extended his greetings.

Entertainment was furnished by the Glee club under direction of Fr. Dunston Johnson.

E. N. Soule, Water Chief, Resigns, Effective on July 1

An ordinance was passed segregating some of the street assessments on Lincoln street as some of the property had been broken up and sold since the assessment was levied. E. N. Soule, water superintendent, tendered his resignation to take effect July 1. This was referred to the next council meeting on June 20.

Open Improvement Of Stayton Park

STATON—The Stayton city park swimming pool has been dredged 400 feet upstream from the bridge.

Mayor W. A. Weddle has announced that the ten-man "PAC" crew will be occupied for most of the month of June upon park improvements. There will be three floats installed in the swimming pools, one of them having a 100-foot fence, having a 1-inch post and two rails, is being erected along the banks of the waterway as a protection to swimmers.

Across the bridge an acre of ground will be cleared and leveled for picnic purposes. Also additional park space has been added by a removal of a fence bordering a small stream in the northeast corner.

Gravel fills in several sections of the park, including the entrance way, are being covered with earth and an open space will be provided with permanent markers for foot racing and other athletic events.

Silverton Is Preparing for First Annual Band Festival on June 24; Cash Award of \$100 Awaits Winner

SILVERTON—Considerable emphasis is being placed on the first annual band festival which will be held at Silverton June 24. As an additional attraction there will be the dedication of Pacific Greyhound stage coach which will operate on a main line and which will bear the insignia of Silverton.

The band festival will be composed of four contests, a band contest, a drum corps contest, an individual drum solo contest and a street marching contest.

In each division prizes will be awarded. In the first three, cash prizes and in the others, trophy awards.

First prize in the band contest is \$100, with second \$50, and third \$25. The drum corps contest will offer \$25 as first prize and \$15 as second.

Awards for band and drum corps contests will be based on music and marching ability. Each band and drum corps will be required to march separately in the streets. The marching distance is about three-quarters of a mile, with left and right turns and counter marches.

The street marching contests will be held Saturday afternoon June 24, at 1 o'clock. Band managers are being asked to meet one hour prior to contests to draw for positions. Each band and drum corps will be required to enter both contests, both street marching and music.

Age limits for the contestants are limited to 21 years. Serving on the committee at Silverton are E. L. Starr, Clifford Dickerson and Roy Tavenport with Hal Campbell as music director.

Fritz Schiedler is to be in charge of transportation and on the clean-up committee are Mildred Dicker, Frances Vandecorver and Virginia Meek. Gerald Zollner is general chairman.

The meetings for both organizations will be discontinued during the summer months. The dances, however, will be continued and will be held on the first Monday of each month.

Crowds Mill at Scene of Tragedy

Tuesday Also Day on Which Similar Accident of 1907 Occurred

SILVERTON HILLS—Curious-minded crowds milled about all day Wednesday and continued up even late at night to examine the scene of the tragedy which occurred at the state park Tuesday afternoon when Mrs. Myrtle P. Lynch of Salem, stepped over the retaining wall at the brink of the South Falls, stepped on a wet rock and was carried by swift water the 134-foot drop to her death.

Old timers recalled only one like tragedy here. This occurred March 10, 1907, when Levi Hostettler, of the Hostettler and Killian Mill company went over the North fork to Silver creek, when the logs jammed at the top of the falls. In an effort to loosen the jam Hostettler was carried over into the pool below. Like this week's accident, the earlier one occurred on a Tuesday, but it was not until Saturday the body was found.

Visitors at the scene recalled that June 1, 1928, Al Fasset, trick-performer, went over the South Falls in a canoe and made a successful landing 34 feet below. The falls was then the property of Dan Geiser, a Silverton real estate broker, and over 1000 people motored to the park to see the performance.

Others recalled the falls as it was when they were children when there was no retaining wall at the brink as there is now.
