

Bond Issue for new Well at Mt. Angel Before Voters on Monday

Polls Open at City Hall, 8-8

Propose \$10,000 Outlay for Drilling, Pumping Equipment

MT. ANGEL—A special election will be held in Mt. Angel Monday, June 12, to determine whether an additional well is to be built in Mt. Angel. The question to be put before the people is to ask whether or not they wish to empower the city to issue bonds in the amount of \$10,000 to finance the drilling of a well and the purchasing of adequate pumping equipment. The bonds are to be redeemed by water revenues and if these should prove insufficient by taxes.

The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. The regular city election board, N. G. Mickel, Joseph Berchtold, Louis Schwab and E. B. Stolle, substituting for N. M. Lauby, will be in charge, the election to be held at the city hall.

It has been deemed a measure of necessary precaution by the city council to plan for a better water supply for the constantly growing town.

If the measure is approved by the citizen, the well will most likely be located to the rear of the city hall.

Margaret Gribble Final Rites Today

Mrs. Gribble was known to her friends as Aunt Margie. She was an active member of Maplewood grange.

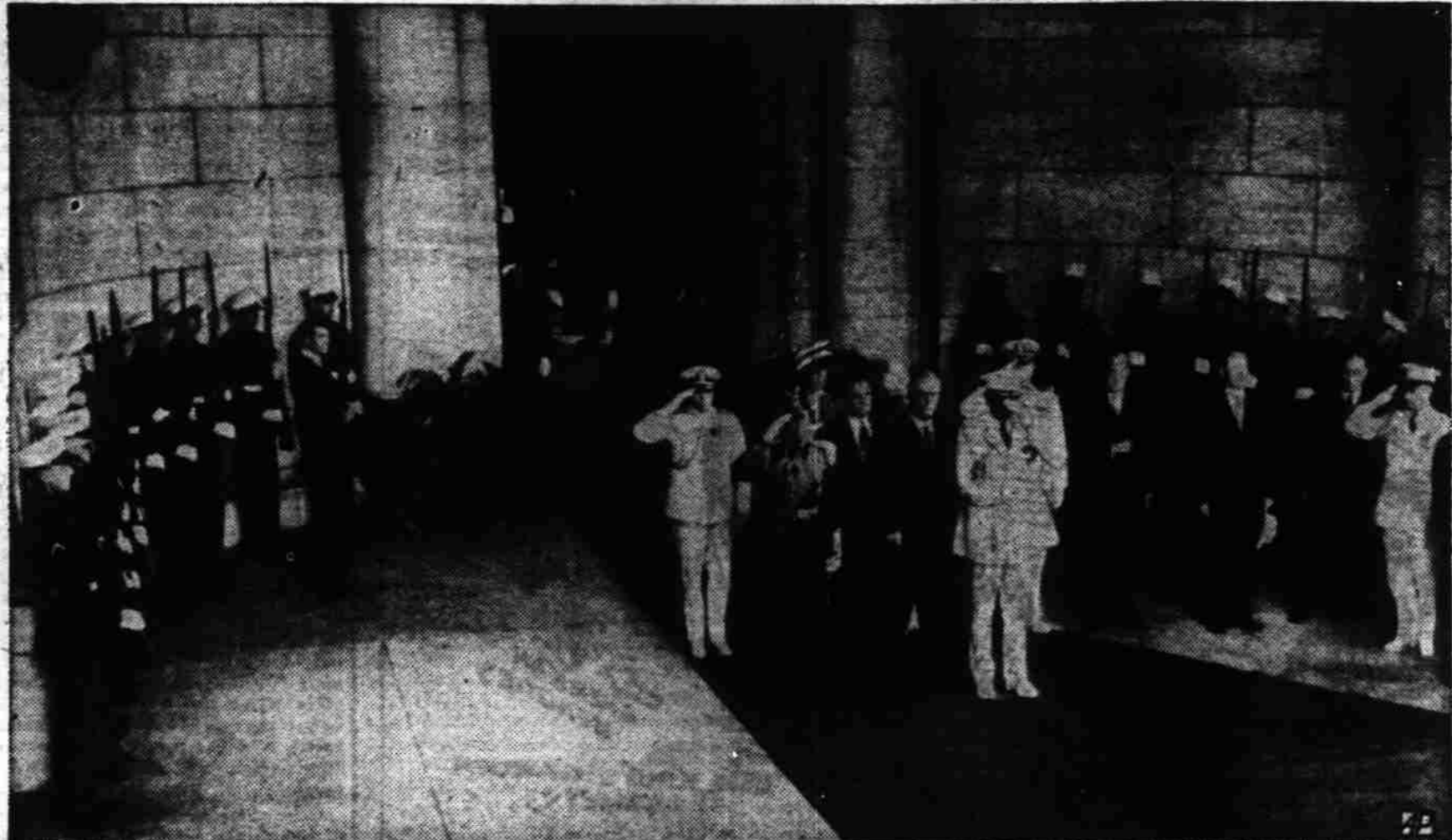
