Leg Is Splintered In Auto Accident

SEATTLE, June 10.—(P)—The piteous cries of Anton Sather, 70, begging them to hurry rang in the ears of rescuers as they frantically tried to free him from wreckage of his automobile after it had been struck by a train here today.

Bystanders shuddered when they learned his leg was pinned under the twisted metal.

"Please hurry," Sather begged. An ambulance arrived with clanging bell just as the rescue was completed.

"You won't need that," Sather said calmly. "It was my wooden leg that was caught."

"Then what was your hurry?" a sweating rescuer demanded.

"I didn't want to be late to work," Sather replied.

And to work he went, after having minor cuts treated at a hospital. Not even the wooden leg was seriously damaged.

Jews Seek Asylum In Great Britain

LONDON, June 11.—(Sunday)—(P)—Pleas for asylum in Great Britain or at least permission to land at Southampton were reported today from the liner St. Louis today to Prime Minister Chamberlain by 907 German Jewish refugees refused permission to land in Cuba.

The message was said to have described the refugees' position as "desperate," explaining it was impossible for them to return to Hamburg.

(The St. Louis started back to Hamburg last week when the passengers were denied entrance to Cuba because their papers were not in order).

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Big Winds Sweep Michigan Region

ADRIAN, Mich., June 10.—(P)—A windstorm of cyclonic proportions in some communities swept over southern Michigan tonight, causing property damage and crippling utilities.

The only casualties were reported near Camden, where two women were cut and bruised when the wind tore away part of a farm house.

Heavy rain fell over a wide area, and hail in some districts damaged crops. Farm buildings were damaged. The Baptist church at Rollin Center were unroofed. Trees and utility poles were blown down.

provide pensions for elderly widows and parents and the minor children of deceased old age insurance participants, doing away with the lump sum payment to heirs as in present law.

The maximum federal contribution to states for old age assistance would be increased from \$15 to \$20 a month, as would the contribution for aid to the blind.

Old age assistance is intended for the indigent aged and is distinct from the old age insurance benefits. The states must match federal funds for this purpose, dollar-for-dollar.

DETROIT, June 10.—(P)—US Immigration Inspector Leland W. Williams took a detailed statement today from Sean Russell, self-styled leader of the outlawed Irish republican army, who was arrested here last Monday, the night before King George and Queen Elizabeth visited nearby Windsor, Ont.

The statement, given behind closed doors, will be sent to the secretary of labor in Washington for final decision on possible deportation of Russell. He is charged specifically with overstaying his 30-day permit to visit the United States. The permit expired May 15.

Bond of \$5000, on which Russell was released after two days in the Wayne county jail, was continued.

Willamette's Law Edifice Dedicated

Rossmann Points out That Legal Training Left to Universities

The Willamette university law college building, completely remodeled since it was placed on the campus opposite the state supreme court building a year ago, was dedicated Saturday afternoon in connection with commencement exercises.

President Bruce R. Baxter conducted the formal dedication following addresses by Justice George Rossmann of the supreme court, David Eccles, state budget director, and Judge James Crawford of Portland, a Willamette graduate.

Tracing the progress of legal education in the United States, Justice Rossmann pointed out that since the demand for highly trained lawyers developed following the Civil War with the industrial expansion, other agencies have abandoned the field and left it almost exclusively to the universities. This, he said, placed a responsibility upon their shoulders which many, including the Willamette law college, are capably fulfilling. He mentioned the achievements of a number of Willamette law graduates, and emphasized that legal training should not make men "smart" but "wise" since the burdens of all three branches of government fall so heavily upon the legal profession.

Eccles declared that "the law in itself is a cold and bloodless thing which takes on the breath of life only when it is touched by human administration" and added that the nation's ability to retain a "government by law" "will inevitably be measured by our ability to administer law with intelligence and with equity."

NEW YORK, June 10.—(P)—Albert Allis Hopkins, 69, a retired editor of the Scientific American, died today.

Innocent Is Plea Of Guy L. Runyan

TILLAMOOK, Ore., June 10.—(P)—Guy L. Runyan, 57, indicted for arson and assault with intent to kill, pleaded innocent before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters today.

Runyan was accused of destroying his wife's store at Netarts last Sunday and firing several shots at officers while resisting arrest. The trial was set for July 11.

Japanese Release British Prisoner

PEIPING, June 10.—(P)—A Japanese army spokesman announced today the release of Lieutenant John Cooper, British assistant military attaché held by Japanese soldiers at Kalgan, northwest China, since his arrest May 26 with Lieut. Col. C. R. Spear, British military attaché, who is still held.

The spokesman said the Japanese embassy would lodge a protest regarding Cooper with the British embassy upon the Briton's expected arrival here under military escort.

Asked whether Spear's release would be conditional upon conditions similar to Cooper's, the spokesman said that the conditions, if any, had not yet been determined.

(Spear was reported charged with collecting military information inside Japanese zones. Cooper was understood to have been held on a different and lesser charge.)

Tompkins Appointed

Morton Tompkins of Dayton, prominent in Oregon grange activities, has been appointed on the national grange's committee on public education to participate in the World Congress on Education for Democracy to be held at Teachers' college, Columbia university, in New York City August 15, 16 and 17. The appointment was made by Louis J. Taber, national grange master.

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
