

Power Service Is Celebrated

Lights Turned on Via New
Silverton Hills Line;
Festival Held

SILVERTON HILLS—Several hundred people from the home district and surrounding communities gathered Friday night for the official turning on of the electric lights in the Silverton Hills which was held in conjunction with the annual strawberry festival.

Gerald W. Mason of Portland was master of ceremonies. Casper J. Towse, president of the Silverton Hills Cooperative Electric company, presided.

Carol Porter Throws Switch
The special lighting feature was in charge of J. H. Polhemus, executive vice-president of the PGE company, assisted by Little Carol Porter, fifth generation in the pioneer Porter family.

Special guests introduced were Walter May, Bert T. McBain, Donald MacArthur, Parry Rose, head of the Silverton PGE district. Rose in turn introduced members of the Hills electric board who included Mr. Towse, Charles Janik, Mrs. L. O. Hadley, Elmer Knauf, Bill King and Willard Benson.

In reference to the local history, Mason said that as early as 1930, the PGE company had a man in the Silverton Hills investigating the feasibility of extending the electric service. From then until the recent accomplishment there have been frequent attempts on the part of both the Silverton Hills people and the company to get the line started. The stumbling block, according to Mason, was that all the interested people couldn't get the same ideas at the same time.

Cost Is Explained
The \$10,000 cost of the new line is made up as follows, according to Mason: "The \$4801 is that part represented by the material purchased on credit from the PGE company, \$2000 in the form of a cash advance, making more than \$6800 furnished by the company, pending its ultimate purchase and operation of the line. Cash advanced by the people in lieu of higher guaranteed minimums, \$845; poles supplied to the value of \$1088; labor representing \$1351."

Transformers, meters, service drops and a number of other items added \$6113, making the total investment the line represented some \$16,193.

Parrs Return Following Fire

Gain First Word of Loss in
Portland Paper; Can't
Explain Cans

SILVERTON—Official investigation carried on at Silverton Saturday in connection with the Fireside Inn blaze, established Frank J. Pratt, operator of the inn, with a complete alibi for the time of the fire. Officers said that they were not placing anyone under suspicion but that it was evident that the fire had been intentionally set and that everyone connected with it would naturally be questioned.

Mr. and Mrs. Pratt left at noon Thursday for Portland where they went to meet Mrs. Mabel Woodard, his sister. They were at 7111 South East Foster Road, Portland, and heard nothing of the fire which occurred

Thursday night, until Friday afternoon at 4 when they read it in a Portland paper. They called Silverton to verify the report, and finding it true returned to Silverton at once.

Cans Are Mystery
The four empty cans found at the rear of the house were a mystery to the Parrs, they reported. They both reported that there were no appliances in the house where gasoline could be used and so naturally have no use for gasoline other than in the car.

Neither one could give any theory as to the origin of the fire as both were quite dazed at the loss of furniture and fixtures which carried an insurance of only \$1200. Their local agent had valued the property insured at approximately \$1500.
