

### Stayton Star 40 Years Old

Early Members Honored at Special Function This Week

STAYTON—The 40th anniversary of Acacia chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, was celebrated Tuesday night at the lodge hall. The worthy patron, Howard George, welcomed the guests, with response by Mrs. Willis Brown of Redmond, a past worthy matron of this chapter. The history of the chapter in Stayton was given by Mrs. Howard George in an original rhymed discourse in which it was brought out that the chapter was instituted on June 26, 1899, by Grand Matron Margaret Lutke, Grand Patron Ryan and Grand Secretary Mabel Settemier, with the assistance of members of Chadwick chapter of Salem.

### Christ English Lutheran Church Of Aurora to Celebrate 40th Year At Special Services Next Sunday

AURORA—Christ English Lutheran church is celebrating its 40th anniversary Sunday, June 18. Services of thanksgiving to the Triune God and festivities appropriate to the occasion are being planned.

Lutheran church work was started in this community by Rev. Earnest Mack of Oregon City June 4, 1898. The following year the congregation was organized with 19 voting members and on July 5 articles of incorporation were filed. The congregation at the present numbers 100 baptized and 69 communicant members.

On January 1, 1937, the congregation voted to change its name from Christ Evangelist Lu-

theran to Christ English Lutheran, not because its teachings had ceased being evangelical but to advertise that all work is carried on in the English language. **Former Pastors**

ST. LOUIS—Funeral services for Prosper LaChappelle, 84, oldest resident here, who died at the Deaconess hospital Sunday night,

were held Wednesday morning at the St. Louis Catholic church. He was stricken with bronchial pneumonia five days before his death.
