Large Crowd Is Expected for Providence Church Annual Meet

SCIO—Twentieth annual memorial services at historic Baptist church at Providence June 18 will attract many from distances, according to present indications.

Founded in April, 1863, by Elder Joab Powell and a few associates who had been persistent and persevering in efforts to establish a shrine for religious worship in what is now the Scio community, the Providence church has progressed in its purposes during the 85 years it has been making history here.

Elder Powell was the grandfather of Mrs. Iva Abbott of Scio, the last surviving member of this pioneer family.
