Gas Accumulation Is Held Responsible for Accident

LEBANON—Morris Alfred Hoffman, 40, well known Lebanon iron worker, was instantly killed Wednesday about 6 p. m. in the blacksmith shop on Oak street operated by his father and himself, by the explosion of a hollow drill, in which gas had accumulated. The impact almost severed his head from his body.
