Kells, executive secretary of the Salem YMCA, who Friday returned from an extensive eastern and southern swing of the United States.

Kells, who went east by train via Los Angeles and the southern route and who drove an automobile back from Detroit, attended a meeting of community chest executives of the Pacific coast at Oakland, Calif., the Presbyterian general assembly in Cleveland, Ohio, a meeting of the general board of YMCA's national council at Buffalo, N.Y., and the national convention of YMCA executive chairmen at Toronto, Canada.

He spent a day in Boston and a day in New York, visiting the national offices of the YMCA and community chest. Stone Is Recalled As Great YM Aid
Harry W. Stone, 70, who died in Portland Monday, was recalled by numerous Salem friends as one who, during his 29 years of work in the organization, had an active part in the early growth of the Salem YMCA.

According to C. A. Kells, executive secretary of the Salem YMCA, Stone began YMCA work

at the age of 22, serving in Texas and Kansas before coming to Portland in 1896. There, where he was an executive for 28 years, he built the Portland YMCA up from but a few unattractive upstairs rooms to a million and a quarter property. "He was one of the outstanding YMCA leaders of America," said Kells.
