Notice of Filing Application for License for a Hydroelectric Project

NOTICE is hereby given that Idaho Power Company, 4346 SE 29th Avenue, Portland, Oregon, has filed with the Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon an application for license for a hydroelectric project to utilize the waters of the North Santiam River near the town of Idanha, Marion County, Oregon. The application is for 249 cubic feet per second of water to develop 327 theoretical horsepower utilizing a head of 15 feet. It is proposed to divert the water from the main channel of the river at the upper end of an island at a point which bears approximately North 56° East 990 feet from the south quarter corner of Section 16, Township 19 South, Range 5 East, W. M. The water would be carried through the existing high water channel on the north side of said island to the power plant and after passing through said plant returned through said channel to the river.

Said application is made subject to the terms of Title XLVI, Chapter XXI, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, and is subject to protests or remonstrances on behalf of the public of any district organized for a public purpose, or any interested person or persons, on the grounds set forth in said law.

All protests and remonstrances should be in writing, in duplicate, should state the grounds thereof and should be filed with the Commission at Salem, Oregon, on or before August 1, 1939.

Breitenbush Bus Setup Is Revised

Special Car to Springs Is to Speed up Service to Other Points

DETROIT—Oldtimers around here estimate it was 50 years ago that the medicinal value of the water at Breitenbush Springs was first known to Oregonians. For many years more venturesome souls walked in through the deep forest. Others, much later, wishing to remain a time, cut a trail through and took up pack trains.

In 1929 a wagon road was completed and the day the road was opened to traffic the Hamman stage line sent in a stage. Since that time the line has maintained the service throughout the summer as part of the Salem-Bend schedule via the scenic North Santiam highway, one of the most beautiful of Oregon roads.

Beginning July 1 the line will put into operation a special car between Detroit and the springs with M. C. Goodman, Detroit, hotel operator as driver.

This service will eliminate the hour layover at Detroit, thus speeding up the service to Bend one hour. It also will include Redmond on the north end of the run. Passengers will be transferred directly from the Salem-Bend stage to the special car.
