

Planes to Tie British Empire

Great Aviation Program to Cement Far-Flung English-Speaking

LONDON, June 29—A chubby, crisp-spoken government officer, son of a Wesleyan minister, told of Britain's scheme to make the airplane, currently Europe's most talked-of instrument of rearmament, a means to bind closer together the English-speaking world.

To Sir Kingsley Wood, air minister, the man who created the one-shilling telephone call to any part of the British Isles, falls the job of spending more than \$1,000,000,000 a year on aviation.

Already constructed are flying boats of 72,000 pounds. Under construction are a land plane of 71,000 and a smaller one of 45,000, all designed for use on routes to help weld the empire and English-speaking peoples.

Girdling World Planned
The world's greatest empire plans to belt the world with air lines in the next two years. Government machinery already is in motion.

Empire planes now fly routes totalling 70,000 miles. They link the southernmost tips of Africa and Australia with London. They serve intra-dominion traffic. Projected are north and south Atlan-

tic lines, a trans-Pacific line from Vancouver, B.C. to Auckland, New Zealand, and a route curving southward around the west coast of Africa supplementing the inland route.

By fall an Australia to New Zealand air service will be in operation.

But Sir Kingsley's talk was of commercial aviation serving men "in a way undreamt of in any period of history."

"We today are building up a great system of air communications," he said, "which will bind closer together the different parts of the English-speaking world."

Dixie Clipper Ends Pay Ocean Flight

22 Paid Passengers Land in Lisbon on Great Transport Ship

LISBON, June 29—(AP)—Aviation's old dream, commercial transportation of passengers across the Atlantic by airplane, was realized tonight when the Dixie Clipper brought the first 22 paying passengers from New York to Lisbon in eight minutes less than a day.

With a crew of 11, besides her passengers, the 41-ton flying boat alighted here on the Tagus river at 7:10 p.m. (3:10 p.m. EST) 22 hours and 55 minutes after leaving Fort Washington, N.Y., on Wednesday. A brief stay of one hour and 44 minutes was made at the Azores this morning.

Pleased as punch was C. V. (Sonny) Whitney, New York socialite, who flew as a passenger and also as chairman of the board of Pan American Airways.

The clocklike performance and the comfort of the journey testified to the fresh appearance of the passengers greatly pleased him.

All the passengers described the trip as without incident.

Tonight a banquet was held at Hotel Aviz where the United States minister, H. C. Pell, unveiled a provisional plaque, a silver trophy and blue ribbon symbol of Pan American's supremacy on the Atlantic.

The clipper is to take off for Marseille at 6 a.m., tomorrow.

Commission Acts To Improve Wine

Better Quality of Wines Sold in Oregon Aim of new Regulation

PORTLAND, June 29—(AP)—Regulations to improve the quality of wines sold in Oregon were adopted today by the Oregon liquor control commission. It was the final action of the three commissioners whose resignations became effective July 1.

The regulations will prohibit importation and sale of any wine fortified by anything except brandy of the fruit from which the wine was made.

They will also bar importation and sale of "wine cocktails" and "nectars," and "type" wines except straight red and white.

The commission said wine consumption in Oregon had fallen off about one-third since the sale of pint and half-pint bottles of fortified wines became illegal but the new regulations were not intended to counteract the drop. Commissioners said the regulations may increase wine prices because of improvement in quality.

AFL Is Certified For Johnson Mills

PORTLAND, June 29—(AP)—The national labor relations board today certified the American Federation of Labor as bargaining agent at the B. F. Johnson sawmill here and pondered a request for postponement of an election at the Kingsley Lumber company. Johnson mill employees selected the AFL in a recent vote, 60-31. Elections held at the Eastern & Western, Portland, and Jones mills were protested and labor board decisions on the protests are still awaited.

A 30-day postponement of the Kingsley election, set for July 6, was requested when the plant closed for three weeks.

Dirt Moving Ends As Drivers Strike

ALBANY, June 29—(AP)—Huge mechanical dirt movers, recently protested by the Albany chamber of commerce, were tied up by a strike of four drivers today.

The civic body maintained use of the equipment on an overhead highway repaving project here displaced too many laborers.

Howe construction company officials, who said the drivers were striking for an increase from \$1.20 an hour to \$1.35, asked Sheriff Herbert Shelton for protection from violence. The sheriff said he anticipated no trouble.

WPA Bridge Falls Before It's Built

MAPLETON, June 29—(AP)—With a crash that jarred the countryside, an unfinished bridge across Knowles creek collapsed here late yesterday.

Nearby blasting was believed responsible for collapse of the 120-foot structure. It was not witnessed. The bridge was a WPA project.

1 Killed, 2 Hurt At Rail Crossing

ONTARIO, Ore., June 29—(AP)—One man was killed and two others injured today when their light automobile was struck by a fast merchandise special train four miles east of Weiser, Idaho.

Dead was Tom Wilson, 24, formerly of Eldorado Springs, Mo., who had lived on Oregon Slope (near the Oregon border) since last spring. His father, Ben Wilson, 49, suffered rib fractures and a punctured lung.

The dead man's brother-in-law, John Renfro, 24, sustained a broken back. The automobile was tossed 80 feet.

Survivors include the younger Wilson's mother of Eldorado Springs.
