



For Oyster Uplift

State Fish Commission State College to Aid Beds' Rehabilitation

Governor Charles A. Sprague resterday announced a joint research project for the rehabilitation of the Yaquina bay oyster industry. The Oregon state fish commis-

sion and Oregon State college will cooperate in the project. The Lincoln county court also will be asked to assist, Purposes of the project will be

to study conditions in the Yaquina oyster area of Lincoln county, consider scientific factors and give attention to the practical methods in the growing of native systers. Prof. Dimick in Charge

Professor R. E. Dimmick, head of the department of fish and game management, will be in charge. A graduate assistant will be stationed at Yaquina bay who will be supplied with the men and equipment needed to conduct the survey. The cost of the project will be \$3000, for the year beginning July 1, to be shared by the participating agencies.

Governor Sprague initiated the plan after vetoing a bill of the last legislature which would have turned the state owned Yaquina oyster beds over to the Lincoln county court for administration.


