among the states were California, Illinois, New York, Ohio and Texas, each with 24 deaths or more. Three members of a single family were killed in a highway crash near Hill City, Kan., and two others were hurt. Four young people returning from a holiday dance were killed in a car-truck collision near Beatrice, Neb.

An ironic tragedy was the death of Edward Fisher, 21, of Chicago, son of the secretary of the national safety council, killed when an automobile skidded off a road in Michigan. He had planned to become a safety engineer.

At Athol, Mass., a 79-year-old man was held on an accusation of shooting into a group of boys who, he said, annoyed him by throwing firecrackers at his house. One of the boys was wounded seriously. Deaths by states were:

Rescue Try Fails; Sea Claims Woman

Boat and Horse Both Fail
to Reach Victim at
Long Beach

LONG BEACH, Wash., July 4.—(AP)—The Pacific ocean claimed the life of Mrs. George Leitch, 42, of Seattle in the only holiday tragedy reported today from Washington's beaches.

State Patrolman A. B. Little reported the woman drowned after she went down with her son, Bartley, 13, while bathing outside the life line. The life guard and other bathers rescued the youth, but Mrs. Leitch had disappeared. Her body was found later in the surf.

Sealed Is Tried
A bathers operating a sealed and a boy on horseback tried unsuccessfully to reach the woman after she had been carried into deep water. C. Bacheider, Portland, tried to maneuver his sealed to a place where she could reach lines attached to the craft. When he failed a boy spurred a horse through the surf but the struggling animal could not make his way to the woman.

Her husband was among thousands of holiday visitors who watched the rescue attempts from shore. Little said reports indicated the mother and son stepped into a crab hole. The tragedy occurred about 1 p. m.

US Heads Back To old Policy

Neutrality Bill to Limit
Arms Sale in Cases of
Civil Wars

WASHINGTON, July 4.—(AP)—The United States appears to be headed back toward its traditional policy of supporting an established government in a civil war.

Such will be the effect of the neutrality bill just passed by the house of representatives, if it or similar legislation is approved by the senate.

One major difference between the new bill and the existing law is the omission of all reference to civil conflicts. The present law contains a provision for the imposition of an embargo on arms to a country torn by civil strife and it was effectively invoked in the case of the Spanish civil war. For two years the nation has followed this departure from its traditional policy and now, if the senate accepts the pending neutrality bill as an equivalent, it would return to the old paths.

Harks to Civil War
Under that old policy, the established government of a friendly state was privileged to buy arms from us and a rebellious force was not. In following it the United States perhaps remembered its experiences of three quarters of a century ago, when this country was divided by the Civil war. The federal government insisted, then, that it alone had the right to purchase arms in the world at large, and that sales of arms to the confederates were unfriendly acts. The government at Washington did in fact make badly needed purchases of arms abroad.

In 1913 congress passed a joint resolution, which it extended in 1922, authorizing the president to embargo the shipment of arms to forces in rebellion against the established government of friendly nations. In accordance with this resolution embargoes were enforced against arms shipments to revolutionary forces in Cuba in 1912, in Mexico in 1912, 1923 and 1929, in Nicaragua in 1921 and in Brazil in 1930.

Treaty Signed in 1928
In 1928 the Coolidge government signed a treaty at the Pan American convention at Havana whereby the United States and other nations of the western hemisphere bound themselves, in case of civil war to "forbid the traffic in arms and war materials except when intended for the government, while the belligerency of the rebels has not been recognized."

Ex-Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson ardently maintained the principle of selling arms to an established government fighting a rebellion. "I am not," he said, "in favor of the exclusive right to the friendly assistance of its neighbors by being permitted to purchase in their markets the necessary supplies and munitions for the purpose of putting down a rebellion; and, further, no similar assistance shall be given to the rebels who have challenged its authority." Stimson, at the beginning of this year, sought to have congress lift the embargo on the shipment of arms to loyalist Spain.

When the Spanish civil war rose over the horizon the United States had already experimented with neutrality in the Greek-Bulgarian war. War clouds hung heavily over Europe and congress desired at all costs to stay out of any conflict that might have its origin in the Spanish conflagration. Hence the joint resolution which was rushed through congress in January, 1937, forbidding the export of arms to either side in Spain. When the present neutrality act was formulated to go into effect May 1, 1937, an embargo on the shipment of arms to a country engaged in civil war was incorporated in it.

Now, if the neutrality bill passed by the house (or one like it) meets with success in the senate, the road once more will lead back to the policy of generations. Governments threatened by rebellion will be able to count upon the sale of arms from a nation which, however, won its own independence precisely through rebellion.

Cancer Diagnosis Meter Found Help

MOSCOW, July 4.—(AP)—An electrical "disease meter" constructed by Russian scientist is proving successful in the early diagnosis of cancer, Ivestia, the soviet government newspaper, reported today.

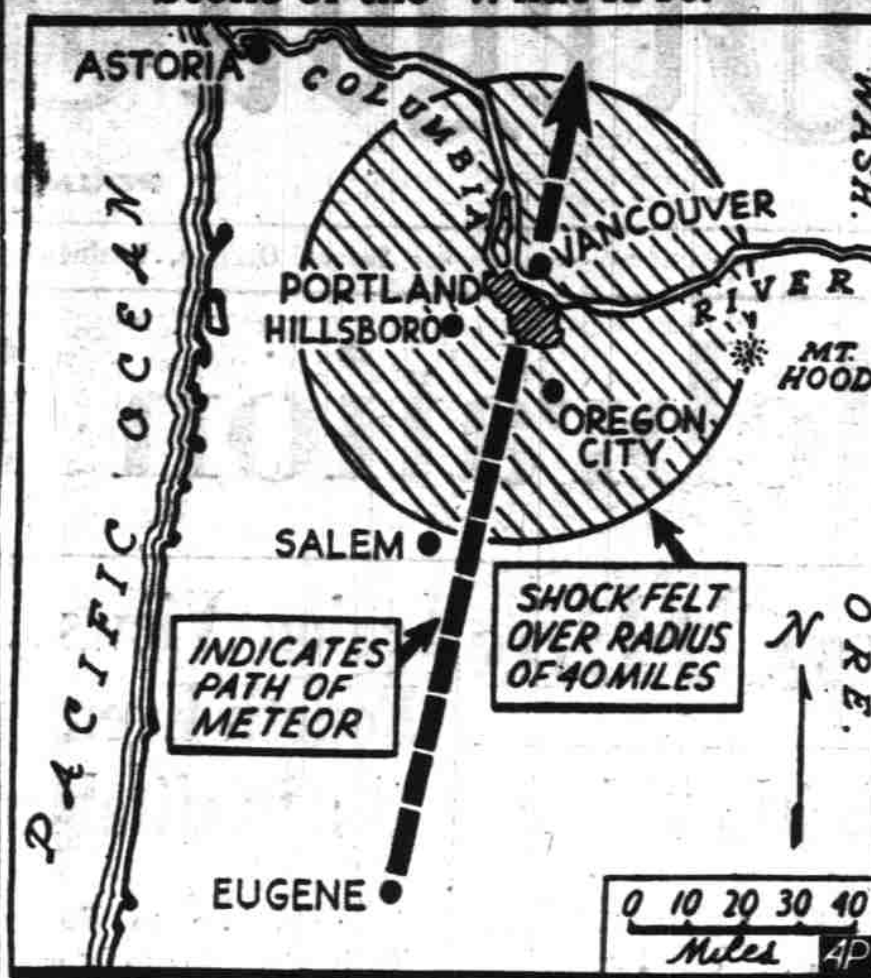
The apparatus was invented jointly by Dr. E. Seikoff of the Leningrad Traumatological Institute and I. Baiygin, an engineer. Ivestia said they started with the idea of adapting methods used by physicists in the analysis of molecular structure to problems of molecular analysis of living organisms.

The first apparatus seemed a failure. "Despite numerous demonstrations of the dielectric constant of the blood fluid they were unable to establish any substantial difference between sick and healthy organisms," Ivestia related.

Finally, however, they learned that when blood from victims of syphilis, cancer or tuberculosis was heated to 55 degrees centigrade (132.5 Fahrenheit) its molecular structure underwent disintegration varying according to the nature of the disease.

Meteor Reported Seen at Chiloquin

University Astronomer Is
Gathering Data to
Chart Course

EUGENE, Ore., July 4.—(AP)—The earth-shaking meteor, apparently burying itself somewhere in the northwest wilds after rocking the Portland area Sunday, was sighted as far south as Chiloquin. J. Hugh Pruett, university of Oregon scientist, said Mr. and Mrs. Paul Howell of Klamath Falls reported they saw the meteor drop behind Mt. Scott. Pruett is assembling information from witnesses in an effort to chart the body's course.

Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Lamb, and Harry Jenkinson, Portland mountaineers, witnessed the disturbance from an elevation of 8500 feet on the Middle Sister in the Cascade range.

They said they saw a tremendous blast of light fill the sky and a long trail of white smoke which hung in the air for 15 or 20 minutes. They did not hear the explosion report until a half hour after the flash.

Oregon to Top World's Fair

State to Draw all Eyes
During two Days of
Next Weekend

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—Oregon is going to celebrate at the Golden Gate International exposition.

And, so extensive are the plans for the celebration, instead of taking the usual one day, it will have to be spread over two whole days, Saturday, July 8 and Sunday, July 9.

Governor Charles A. Sprague will head the distinguished delegation from the northwestern state, with numerous other officials in his party.

Official welcoming ceremonies will be held for the visitors at Treasure Garden at 11 o'clock on the morning of Saturday, July 8, with the Treasure Island company and band of the 13th Infantry at attention. Following their greeting by exposition officials they will be given a military escort to the federal plaza where they will be welcomed by Commissioner George Creel. A brief inspection of federal exhibits will follow.

Parade in Morning
At 11:30 Governor Sprague will head the Pendleton roundup parade and at noon the rose armada will be in flight over the island.

Luncheon will be held by Governor Culbert L. Olson in the California building at noon with state, federal, civic and exposition officials in attendance.
During the afternoon a program of special entertainment will be presented in the auditorium of the hall of western states in which the YMCA tumblers, Eugene gleemen and others will participate. Governor Sprague will visit the extensive Oregon exhibit and will take part in a radio broadcast over the NBC blue network from 3:30 to 4:00, with the Hinson quartet, cowboy quartet and others providing the musical numbers.

Ashland Actors Due
Performance of "The Taming of the Shrew" by the Oregon Shakespeare Festival association of Ashland will be presented in the hall of western states at 8 o'clock. The governor and his party will attend the world's fair international horse show early in the evening and will later attend the performance of the "Cavalcade of the Golden West" where a special scene will be presented depicting the historic trek of Lewis and Clark, famed explorers of the northwest country.

At 10:30 in the evening the visiting officials will attend the naval ball at the California building.

Sunday's program will have as highlights the reception of Ashland's "queen" at the Shasta Cascade building, Elizabethan fencing and other acts, official dedication of the Oregon flag at the same building and another presentation of "The Taming of the Shrew."

Hoover Blasts FDR Policies

Asserts President Brings
Threat of War Closer
by His Actions

NEW YORK, July 4.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover asserts in a magazine article to be published tomorrow that President Roosevelt has brought the threat of war closer to this country by taking "a seat at the table where (international) power politics is being played."

Writing in the current issue of The American Magazine, the former president says "the dangers of our being dragged into war lie in these directions:

"1. Foreign propaganda to inflame our emotions and to mold our minds to war.

"2. Preachments of our mistaken officials and citizens which, in effect, support these propaganda.

"3. Steps taken by our own government which, while denying that they are intended to take us into war, yet entangle us with these very controversies, the end of which may be war."

To stay out of war, Hoover asserts, "the first thing required is vigorous, definite statement from all who have responsibility, both publicly and privately, that we are not going to war with anybody in Europe unless they attack the western hemisphere.

"The second thing is not to sit in this game of power politics." Regarding the danger of war which he says "comes from the policies of our own government," Hoover adds:

"President Roosevelt has taken a seat at the table where power politics is being played. He has joined the chessboard of Europe. He lines us up in the balance of power. It is said we can do this without joining in war.

"It is said we will do something more than words and less than war. When we open fire on the front we are in the fight. The enemy will fire back with more than words. If the more than words fail to overcome him we have to go further. For then we have to win or be overcome on our side. Let nobody say that you can do such things without danger of war itself."

Discussing the activities of propagandists, Mr. Hoover continues: "We are told that we must join in war or democracy will disappear from the earth. From the alliance of democracies with several totalitarian states that ideological issue seems somewhat confused.

"My sympathies are with the democracies. But the democracies of western Europe have the resources to defend themselves. We are told that if they fail we shall be the next victim. I do not agree that they will fail. But if they do fall the exhaustion of the dictators will leave us alone for a quarter of a century at least."
